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HONOKAA HAS TROUBLES

Opposing Factions Nominate Their Own Men

(Special Correspondence.)
 HILO, Sept. 2.—While the Island of Hawaii has been unable to produce anything quite as startling as the row in the Manoa precinct in Honolulu, the precinct at Kukuiahaele, the twelfth, seems to have been able to stir up a little excitement of its own.

Last week Hilo was regaled with a report to the effect that there were two Republican precinct clubs in that precinct, and that each one of these had nominated a set of delegates to the territorial and to the county conventions, with the inevitable result that two delegations from the same precinct would arrive at each convention. This caused some excitement, but no detail of the matter were learned before the following letter of explanation was received from the president of the precinct club by Chairman of the County Committee Beers:

"Honokaa, Hawaii, Aug. 29, 1910.
 Wm. H. Beers, Esq., Hilo, Hawaii.
 My Dear Sir:—Just a few words to write to you in regard to what is now happening among our club members.
 On the night of the 26th inst. a meeting of our club was held at Kukuiahaele schoolhouse, and made nominations for delegates to the Territorial and district and county conventions; when I was told that some of the members were notified of no meeting that night, for reasons I could not understand. This rumor for postponement prevented a good many from attending. Anyway, I held the meeting and made nominations with a few attendees, about eight in number.
 On the following night, Mr. Wm. Horner and his crowd held their meeting; whether they organized a new club I can not tell you for sure at present; but one thing I can tell you for sure, that they made nominations for delegates of their own to be voted at the same time and place as ours.
 There shall be some confusion when that time comes I am afraid.
 I have heard that a new roll book has been sent to Mr. Horner for registration of those who wish to become members of the club. I do not consider it necessary to have it, as we still have the old roll in which we enroll applicants right along.
 My intention is this: as both parties will vote for their delegates at the same time and place, I will have my judges of election ready at the polling place and be ready to receive those who have already registered in our old roll book; otherwise their votes will be thrown out. Or, if they vote for different delegates than those who were nominated at our meeting by us, we will reject their ballots.
 At the opening of our meeting on the 26th, our roll book was opened up to the close of our meeting. But in order to meet with the requirements of our rules and regulations, I advised our secretary to keep it open accordingly. Up to the present time no one has applied to become a member.
 I am of the idea that no more registrations are allowed until the election of delegates will be over.
 What shall I do in this case? As far as I can see into this matter, I have lived up to the rules and regulations of the Republican party as far as our club work is concerned. Will you recognize others' delegates? Am I right in what I have already stated?
 I should like to have you write to me by Wednesday's overland mail, as the matter looks very serious to me and to others who are interested in political matters.
 Mai poia i ka pane mai (Don't forget to answer). Owanou,

 Chairman, 12th Precinct Club.
 P. S.—I do not know how these people could go and nominate their delegates beside what the club nominated; as I suppose our club is the right one to make these nominations."
 The club referred to by Kealoa nominated for the Territorial convention Alex. Arthur and Abel Makakau, and for the county convention Solomon Burke, J. G. Jones, J. Koukahi and John K. Kealoa.
 It is understood that the Horner faction nominated Wm. Horner for the territorial and Am. Ahrens for the county convention. The precinct has a right to be represented by one delegate to the Territorial and by two delegates to the county convention.

ANTONE KAOO STOPS RUNAWAY

Old Waialua Horse Shows Remarkable Race

Antone Kaoo, the well known "Waialua Horse," did a fine run this morning when he followed and finally caught a runaway horse that had dashed up King street dragging a wagon after him.

BRITISH CRUISER IS SAVED BY WIRELESS

PORTSMOUTH, England, Aug. 13.—The first-class British armored cruiser Duke of Edinburgh, with 759 officers and men on board, went ashore tonight in a dense fog, striking on the rocks at St. Catherine, Isle of Wight, and was in a dangerous position until taken off by tugs.
