HOW BILL LANG MET DEFEAT

Al. Kaufman Was Too Heavy and Strong for Boxer From Antipodes.

Al Kaufman, the heavyweight of California, tonight got the popular decision over Bill Lang, the Australian heavyweight, says the Chronicle of September 6. Only in one round—the second—did the Australian show to advantage.

From this round to the close of the fight Kaufman had all the advantage. The fight, as a spectacular exhibition, was disappointing. Time and again Lang would lead with his left and then rush to a clinch, it requiring the assistance of the referee to force the men apart.

In the sixth round Kaufman rushed his man all around the ring, but was unable to land the knockout blow. Kaufman left the ring without a spark, while Lang's face was swollen and there was a cut between his eyes where Kaufman had sent a hard right.

When the principals appeared in the ring between 7000 and 8000 persons were in the park, including many women. The ring was pitched midway between the home plate and the pitcher's box and was perfectly lighted by giant arc lights suspended from the top of the grandstand.

The principals reached the city early in the afternoon. Both men were in the pink of condition and did not appear to carry an ounce of superfluous flesh. Kaufman looked to be at least twenty pounds heavier than the Australian. The fight was at catchweight and for a percentage of the receipts.

Kaufman had in his corner as chief adviser, Billy Delaney, probably one of the greatest seconds in the country. While Kid McCoy looked after Lang.

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VINCENT WHITNEY, CHAMP.

Austin White Beaten After Close Golf at Del Monte. DEL MONTE, Aug. 31—Vincent Whitney of the San Francisco Golf and Country Club is national champion of the Pacific Coast Golf Association for the year 1910, having defeated Austin White of the Oahu Country Club of Hawaii, now of San Francisco, by a margin of 5 holes in a match played on Sept. 2.

The brilliant play usually expected in a championship match was missing. As an exhibition of good golf, the match was not to be compared with that of the previous day. When Whitney disposed of Newton, what was lacking in sustained play of the first class, however, was more than made up by the closeness of the struggle. White was behind from the eleventh hole onward, but threatened at any moment to assume the lead, and down to the very end players and spectators were keyed to a high pitch. This tension, in fact, probably had much to do with the mediocre play of the contenders.
