Don't be fooled or ruled by a political Boss. Don't be a Democrat.

power. After he gets what he wants, he is willing that the horrible immigration that he has painted in its most unattractive forms shall do its worst with the people of the Territory of Hawaii.

This is the only explanation of the situation that can be accepted by reasonable men.

There is no business sense in the scheme of suspension that is outlined by the Boss-dictated plank. There is nothing of good business management for the Territory to go to all the expense of establishing the connections and the paraphernalia needed for securing immigration, and after the whole thing is in perfect working order, drop it for two years, allow the plant to lie idle; then at the end of this forced period of depression, incur the additional expense of getting the machinery in motion again.

No one knows this better than Boss McCandless. He would never think of handling one of Link McCandless' properties in that manner. He would laugh it to scorn if such a proposal were made in the directorate of sugar plantations with which he is connected.

But the system appeals to the Boss of the Democratic party. Why?

That is the way with all bosses. They will "take it out of the people" without the slightest compunctions of conscience. They will do things in politics that they would refuse to consider in the management of their own personal affairs or of a corporation.

The only question in this campaign is whether the people will allow themselves to be fooled by the Democratic Boss.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., September 6.—United States Senator Robert M. LaFollette has swept the State of Wisconsin in the primary election for renomination, defeating his opponent, Samuel A. Cook of Neenah, by from three to five to one.

F. E. McGovern, Republican, who won fame as the anti-graft District Attorney of Milwaukee, is making a strong race for the gubernatorial nomination. There is now a certainty that county option has been defeated by a big majority.

(Continued from Page 1.) by the trustees, first whether indigent pupils can be admitted to other than Kamehameha Schools and their expenses paid in such schools, and second, whether either support and education can be given independently of the other.

Attorney General Lindsay in giving an opinion in the case holds that the clause means that indigent children may be sent to any school either here or on the mainland, in regard to the first question and as to the second that support and education may be given independently of each other, as others refers to someone besides children.

The case will be taken to the Supreme Court in order that a deciding opinion may be gained from the highest tribunal of justice in the territory.

LITTLE STOCK TRADING

The business done in stock trading today is worse than yesterday. Between boards but two stocks figured in transactions—twenty-five Wailuku at 185 and the same number of shares of Honokaa at 18.
