Sierra Comes With Many

Hawaii's Rifle Team Arrives Home—New Machines For Local People.

One hundred and fifty cabin passengers, about forty of whom are tourists, and twenty in the steerage, and 2100 tons of general cargo for this port arrived this morning in the steamship Sierra from San Francisco.

Money Shortage In Departments

Circuit Court Appropriations Nearly Exhausted By Expenses Of Year

"If we can scrape through with the contingent fund we shall do well," said Governor Freat this morning in discussing financial conditions of the Territorial government.

In many departments the money for the fiscal period is nearly all used at the present time, and there are over nine months yet to provide for before the end of the period.

The circuit courts are behind in three circuits, the Honolulu circuit having but \$6000 out of an appropriation of \$24,000 to carry it through the remaining months of the year.

The Normal School has to be provided for also, as there was no appropriation made for it at the last session of the Legislature, when school affairs were turned over to the counties and the Normal was left unprovided for.

Quarantine and fumigation station and the prison have also spent more than was anticipated at the time the appropriation was made, and Governor Freat is trying to see how it will all come out.

Last year and every previous year it has been necessary to ask the Legislature for an additional appropriation to cover the running expenses of some departments during the few last months of the session, and to go away with this condition.

Secretary Tells of Good Work in Washington by the Delegate.

"The fact that Hawaii has fared better in the way of appropriations from Congress as regards other Territories in the Union, is due to the influence and popularity of the Prince, the late King of Hawaii."

George B. McClellan, the Delegate's private secretary in Washington, who returned this morning in the Sierra made the above remarks on board the liner, when interviewed by a Bulletin reporter.

McClellan stated further that Kaulanone's influence had much to do with the securing of a certain amount of appropriation for the Federal Building in Hilo, Hawaii.

Those in Washington, according to McClellan have great respect for the Prince. He is well known in the Capitol and his gentlemanly manners have won for him the respect and good will of the Congressmen and the public at large.
