**EIGHT HOUR LAW.**  
 May Require General Revision of Appropriations.

Honolulu, May 2.—A spectre arose in the Senate this morning and almost created a panic for a time, until a few reassuring legal opinions were given.

The spectre was the eight hour law passed at the regular session. Senator Achi announced that it would be necessary to increase the appropriation for salaries of the police fifty per cent because of the eight hour law, because now the police stood twelve hour watches but under the eight hour law could not be required to, so that it would require fifty per cent more men.

Senator Isenberg immediately declared that he didn't believe the eight hour law applied. Senator Achi said the governor thought it did and had called his attention to it whereupon he had re-read the law and was convinced that it did. Most of the senators thought it could not possibly apply to the police department, because it was never intended to apply to the police, until Senator Isenberg got a copy of the law and read the section in question which is section two of an act entitled an Act to regulate the employment of labor on the public works of this territory, and is as follows:

"Eight hours of actual service shall constitute a day's labor for all mechanics, clerks, laborers and other employees employed upon any public works or in any public office of this Territory, or any political sub-division thereof, whether the work is done by contract or otherwise. Provided, however, that the full eight hours shall not apply to Saturdays or any holidays."

Then most of the Senators thought it did apply, until Senator Dickey analyzing the language of the section reached the conclusion that as the police were not employed on public works and did not work in an office but out under the blue canopy of heaven, they were not included. President Crabbe ventured the opinion that Dickey was the only lawyer that would construe the language in that way.

Senator McCandless thought that the duties of the police were of such a character that they would come under the exception in favor of emergencies.

Senator Isenberg who had been out making a flank movement on the spectre brought back word that the police themselves had constructed the law as to include them, and had given the high sheriff intimation of their construction of the statute. He also said that the Attorney General held that the law did not include the police department.

Dickey triumphantly called the attention of President Crabbe to this fact as proving that there was at least one other lawyer who agreed with him in his construction of the law.

Finally all the items of the police department in the bill under consideration were referred to the judiciary committee to get the opinion of the Attorney General and the Justices of the Supreme Court on the construction of this statute.

**PEARL HARBOR LAND CASES.**  
 Decided in the Court of Appeals at San Francisco.

San Francisco, Cal., May 4.—To Assistant District Attorney Dunne, Honolulu: Honolulu plantation judgment reversed. Error admitting testimony capacity mill and pumping plant, and, specially, value tract to plantation. Remanded new trial. Jury trial upheld. Ross, judge. Have notified Department. License case appeal dismissed, lack of jurisdiction on constitutional questions.

POND.

Two decisions have thus been rendered by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals upon judgments in the United States District Court for the District of Hawaii. Assistant District Attorney J. J. Dunne received the information by cable from Captain Pond, U. S. N., this morning.

Judgment for \$102,000 and odd in the condemnation suit against Honolulu Plantation Company, for land required for the Pearl Harbor Naval Station, is reversed by the appellate court and a new jury trial ordered. This is the first adverse decision Judge Estee has sustained in his nearly three years of presiding over the Federal Court. It comes from his having yielded to the impertunity of counsel for the defendant in admitting certain testimony.

In the case of the Primo beer license law, the appeal from Judge Estee's decision making the law void is dismissed. Mr. Dunne considers the wording of the cablegram relative to this case as somewhat ambiguous, but takes it to mean that the judgment of the trial court is affirmed. It makes little difference now to the public, since the Legislature has passed a new beer license law without the provisions that Judge Estee found invalidated the former one. The suit was brought by the general liquor interests against Treasurer W. H. Wright, to restrain him from issuing Primo beer licenses.

Mr. Dunne represented the United States in the land, condemnation case and the plaintiffs in the beer case, assisted in the latter by Robertson & Wilder. Hatch & Silliman were attorneys for the defendants in both cases.

Mr. Silliman understands the words of the cablegram differently to Mr. Dunne's interpretation. He says that as the appeal did not raise the question of jurisdiction of the appellate court, but of the trial court, the decision probably dismisses the bill and leaves the beer law as it stood before the proceedings began.

**Investigate City Postoffices.**  
 Washington, D. C., May 6.—The exposures following the Postoffice Department headquarters in Washington have been of such a far-reaching and serious nature that Postmaster General Payne has taken steps for investigating the administration of the postoffices in all the chief cities of the country. The postoffice ring that was smoked out in Washington has made the large offices the special object of its graft. It is the intention of Mr. Payne, backed up by the President to ferret out every member of the ring and place the Department above suspicion.

**Russian Ships Appear.**  
 Yokohama, May 5.—Reports have been received here of the presence at the mouth of the Yalu river, in Korea, of several Russian warships. This new phase of the situation in the north has caused great anxiety here.

**Colorado Greets Roosevelt.**  
 Denver, Colo., May 4.—President Roosevelt has been given an uproarious reception by the people of Colorado from the time his train first came within the borders of the State. Crowds have assembled at every station and all along the route small gatherings cheered the passing Chief Executive. The reception at Denver was especially gratifying.

**Manchurian Situation.**  
 Washington, D. C., May 4.—The correspondence of the State Department with the Russian officials has served to relieve the tension existing since Russia made its radical demands upon China for cession of Manchuria. The statement was given out today that the situation is very much improved.

**Bremen, Germany, May 9.**—All the Bremen shipyards have been closed down on account of labor troubles.
