MATTERS IN COURT.

Busy Week With Equity and Probate Business. Judge Little has been trying a number of equity and probate cases the past week. The suit of Chas. McFarland vs. F. S. Lyman, L. C. Lyman and J. Reese required four days to try and is now under advisement. The suit is one for specific performance of a contract to purchase certain lands above Kaunama. The deal was made in 1899 and all the purchase price paid at the time except about \$8000, for which suit is now brought. The defense alleges a verbal contract which provides that the defendant was to clear the land and put in crops, the expense to be borne by the plaintiff. It is also alleged by the defense that a power of attorney from the McFarlands to the defendants authorized such work and expenditures on behalf of the plaintiff. Wise & Ross for plaintiffs; Smith & Parsons for defendants. The suit of I. E. Ray vs. B. H. Brown on covenant of warranty to recover damages has been tried and is under advisement by the Court. The plaintiff asks for \$1500 under a warranty deed from the defendant for a lot on Volcano street, the claim being that one-third of the property sold did not belong to the defendant and was erroneously included in the description in the deed. Le Blond & Smith for plaintiff; Smith & Parsons for defendant. The Japanese parents of the 14 1/2 year old wife of one Tzuka, on a writ of habeas corpus, asked for the custody of their daughter on the ground that she was illegally restrained of her liberty by her husband. After hearing, the writ was quashed and the young wife restored to the custody of her husband. The will of the late August G. Serrao has been filed for probate, and John G. Serrao and M. G. Santos appointed temporary administrators. I. E. Ray, as Administrator for the estate of Gus Schwartz, has made his final report and received his discharge.

The Band Finances.

The Hilo band has been again provided for financially by popular subscription. C. C. Kennedy circulated a paper a few days ago and raised over \$600. This will give a new impetus to the work of the band boys which is thoroughly appreciated by the people of Hilo. The band has been liberally patronized by local Hilo merchants and business men and is distinctly a Hilo organization. It receives no subsidy from the Territorial treasury.

Good Soldiers Delight Hilo People and Themselves.

The exhibition drill at Hoolulu Park last Sunday by Company F from Honolulu attracted a large crowd. The grand stand was well filled by people who applauded the movements of Captain Johnson's men at every turn. In fact the soldiers of this good company, whether in the street or on the parade ground have won favorable comment and applause from the people of Hilo during their encampment here.

Last Sunday, the afternoon was well filled with entertainment for the people. A ball game between Beamer's Specials and the Hilo Railroad nine came first. The game was one of the best of the season and resulted in a victory for the Waikaha boys with a score of 5 to 2. The section men led off with good batting and monumental luck in the first inning, giving them a lead of three scores, which the bike boys failed to duplicate. Crow and Knell umpired the game.

The appearance of Captain Johnson and his men in the center field was a signal for applause from the grand stand. The company went through a variety of evolutions with such precision and soldierlike bearing that the ripple of approbation from the spectators, did not stop until the Captain and his men left the field.

The proceeds at the gate were nearly \$200, of which about \$125 went to the visiting soldiers.

Monday morning, the company, consisting of 44 men, went to the Volcano House. They went by rail to Mountain View, from whence a march of six hours through tropical woods brought them to the welcome of Manager Bidgood at Hawaii's famous hostelry. They arrived at 3 o'clock p. m. At the Volcano, they visited the crater and other points of interest and at night bivouaced on the billiard room floor.

The company returned to Hilo Wednesday morning. Last night the men marched through Hilo streets and drilled at the Postoffice corner, after which a big luau was given at their quarters on Volcano street. Today they depart by the Kinai for Honolulu having had a strenuous but lovely time on the Big Island.

Union Meeting.

The union meeting Sunday evening was unusually well attended. All were glad to see the Hilo Boarding School cadets again in their accustomed places. Rev. F. L. Nash presided, and the preliminary parts were taken by the local clergy.

The Waikaha Mission children attended in a body and added greatly to the interest by their well-rendered selections. The same can be said of the male quartette and the solos by Mr. Kelima. Mrs. Black's recitation, "A London Waif," was earnestly and gracefully given.

The speaker of the evening—a woman, by the way, using as a text Longfellow's couplet:

"The woman with the lamp shall stand A chosen symbol of the land," showed how women have helped in the work of the world.

Her lamp has burned with greatest brilliancy in the church of God, and has irradiated the dark places of heathenism with gospel light. It has brightened hospital and camp when the dread scourge of war was in the land, and has burned as a clear and steady beacon in philanthropy and education. It led the men in the great temperance reform, and through its power and influence will come the clear, calm shining of the sun over a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness.
