PRESIDENT SPEEDING EAST

SPECIAL TRAIN LEAVES DENVER FOR CHICAGO.

Roosevelt Discusses Question of Railroad Rate Legislation at Banquet Tendered Him.

Denver, Col., May 10.—The presidential special train, consisting of a baggage car, buffet car, sleeper, private car of the general manager of the road, and the president's private car "Rocket," pulled by one of the new monster engines, left the Union depot here over the Union Pacific railroad for Chicago promptly at seven o'clock Tuesday morning.

The huge engine was literally smothered in decorations consisting of triangular effects in hunting. Several large portraits were displayed on the sides of the engine-car.

The first stop made by the special was at Fort Morgan, Col. The president made a one-minute speech from the rear end, in which he predicted increased prosperity for the state.

At the banquet given by the Denver chamber of commerce Monday night the president discussed government regulation of railroad rates, declaring such regulation, in a conservative manner, to be a necessity.

NAMING INDIANS NOT EASY Native Sioux Describes Laboriousness of Deciding on Cognomens for Tribesmen.

The fact that two of the most interesting native races of the world are not decreasing was brought out at the Saturday meeting of the Twentieth Century club by Dr. Charles H. Eastman, of Lakota, a Sioux Indian, and Miss Wilhelmina B. Bain, who gave an account of the Maoris, of New Zealand, says the Boston Herald.

Dr. Eastman told about the work he is doing in the naming of the Sioux Indians and thus facilitating the recognition of their title to inherited land.

"Leaving out the medicine men, the Indians, so far as I can find out, are not hostile to the American government, except when undue pressure is brought to bear upon them and they are turned out of their homes."

RUSSIAN FLEET DRAWS ANCHOR

ROJESTVENSKY LEAVES VICINITY OF VANFONG BAY AFTER SEVERAL DAYS' STAY.

Divisions of Czar's Squadron Must Not Join in Waters Within Three-Mile Limit—Japanese Threats Not Taken Seriously at St. Petersburg.

Paris, May 10.—Orders have been sent to the civil and naval authorities in French Indo-China not to permit the junction within French waters of the Russian naval forces under Rear Admiral Rojostvensky and Rear Admiral Nebogatoff.

These orders resulted from the receipt of a detailed dispatch giving an account of Admiral De Jonquieres' meeting with Rojostvensky.
