THE TAX LEVY IS CONSTITUTIONAL

Supreme Court Upholds the Action of the State Board of Equalization.

Bosch, Idaho, Nov. 1.—The Supreme Court has decided that the state tax levy certified to the various counties is constitutional. This point was raised as to the authorities of Shoshone, Latah and Nez Perce counties. They claimed the levy exceeded the five mills on the dollar authorized by the constitution to be raised for "state purposes." The matter was brought into court in the form of an action of the state board against each of the three counties asking for a writ of mandate compelling each to extend the levy as certified. The opinion rendered is in the case against Nez Perce county, being made applicable to the other two.

The state claimed the amount levied for state purposes did not exceed the five mill limit, other amounts such as those for meeting interest, etc., not being included in the constitutional limit. Its claim was that the limit applied only to taxation for running the state government during the period for which the tax was to be called. Attention is called to the fact that there is no limit to the state indebtedness that may be created as the assessed valuation increases, as it may always be up to 1 1/2 mills on the dollar. Continuing, the opinion says:

CAPTURED SEVEN CHINAMEN.

Inspector D. H. Andrews makes a Big Capture.

D. H. Andrews, Chinese Inspector at this place made a capture of seven Chinese last Wednesday evening. The Celestials were trying to smuggle themselves into the United States. There was a China woman among the bunch, the wife of the leader.

Inspector Andrews gathered the seven in at the Kootenai Valley bridge, just below town. He was on the look-out and about midnight his vigil was rewarded by the procession coming across the bridge. He waited until they had climbed down the ladder off of the bridge, when he came out from his hiding place behind the bridge timbers and placed them under arrest, to which they submitted tamely. The pilot was discovered to be old "Jake", the well-known Chinese gardener who rents a part of the McLaughlin ranch. This was not a surprise to Inspector Andrews, however, as the old fellow had been under suspicion for sometime. He was also placed under arrest and may have

to face a more serious charge than that which merely results in deportation.

The drove was locked up, pending instructions from the District Immigration officers.

The leader, Le Hung Gnin, was in Bonners Ferry last August and was rounded up by Mr. Andrews. His papers appeared to be regular. He claimed he was here on a visit to old Jake. But it was learned that he hurried on through to British Columbia, where it seems the woman was located. Inspector Andrews has been on the look-out for the couple ever since, expecting that an attempt would be made to smuggle the woman through.

This is the second capture Mr. Andrews has made in the last month, having arrested five others a few weeks ago.
