### An Exciting Time.

The home of Conductor Geo. P. Towne was the scene of a very exciting time last Tuesday evening. We have all heard the expression, "a cat fit," but Mr. and Mrs. Towne experienced the real thing. The family cat went wrong about 10 p. m., before the family retired, and commenced running and jumping as though possessed of Old Nick. Mr. Towne was sitting on a chair near a stand upon which rested a large Rochester lamp. He was utterly helpless, as one of his lower limbs was done up in splints, having had his knee cap broken about three weeks ago while jumping from a train. The cat made a dive in his direction and attempted to scale the ceiling just over the lamp, struck against the wall, and fell back, upsetting the lamp, which rolled down along Mr. Towne's injured member. The oil commenced to leak out and take fire, but Mrs. Towne with rare presence of mind and bravery picked up the lamp and threw it into the yard. In the meantime the carpet had taken fire, and it required some lively exertions to extinguish the flames. It was very fortunate that the results were no more serious. Immigration Inspector D. H. Andrews, a near neighbor, was called over to put the finishing touches to the lamp and put things in order. It was feared Mr. Towne might have injured his knee again, but fortunately such was not the case.

### Thinks well of Bonners Ferry.

Charles G. Reeder, of Spokane, owner of several fine tracts of land in the Kootenai Valley, arrived Tuesday and remained over until Wednesday, on business connected with his interests here. In company with A. J. Kent, his representative at this place, he drove out to take some personal observations.

Mr. Reeder has great faith in Bonners Ferry. He thinks it only a question of a few years until our bench lands will be cleared and assume considerable importance in an agricultural way. These lands, with our great valley, the timber industry, our transportation facilities, and other advantages, are bound to build up an important town at Bonners Ferry.

Mr. Reeder believes that the town ought to build and own its own water system, declaring it to be far cheaper in the long run. The Herald believes the town could finance the proposition.

## THE FIRST STATE BANK.

### The Name of the New Banking Institution of Bonners Ferry.

"The First State Bank of Bonners Ferry" is the name of a new financial institution organized this week to do business in Bonners Ferry. The incorporators are W. P. Mahoney, W. D. Baxter and J. I. Monks, of Watertown, S. D., and A. E. Rickerd, of the Bonners Ferry Lumber Co., and F. T. Moore, of Moore Bros., of this place.

The capital stock of the institution is to be \$15,000. The articles of incorporation are all signed up, except the signature of Mr. Monks, who is at present in California. Mr. Mahoney returned Tuesday from Spokane where he placed his order for bank fixtures. The institution will commence business as soon as the building can be fitted up, and the legal requirements as to incorporating complied with, including the examination by the state examiner.

The bank will be located in the Hollinger building. Mr. Mahoney having made the purchase of the property on Thursday, paying \$1200 cash for the same.

Mr. Mahoney and Mr. Baxter are the organizers of the institution. They are highly impressed with the outlook for Bonners Ferry.

Both Mr. Mahoney and Mr. Baxter are married men, and they will bring their families here, between now and spring.

### Land Commissioner Munson Here.

Hon. Chas. J. Munson, state land commissioner, was in Bonners Ferry last Tuesday on official business. He was accompanied by Mr. Hadley, one of his field workers.

This has been a very busy year in the land department. In addition to transacting the ordinary business of the department, selections to the extent of over 210,000 acres have been made, as against a little over 400,000 acres in the 10 years previous. Then, again, each legal subdivision has been carefully inspected and its value determined before filing, which has not always been the case in the past. It should be born in mind also that selections are much more difficult to make now than a few years ago, because so much land has been thrown into forest reserves, and other lands settled up, leaving so much less desirable land to select from.

Mr. Munson has demonstrated that his selection for commissioner was a particularly fortunate one, having handled his department with energy as well as good sense and honesty. He is making a splendid record.
