—Geo. W. Martin, in charge of the construction of the S. & I. R'y bridge across the Kootenai, informs the Herald that he will be able to complete the bridge by February 15, if he is not delayed by the non-arrival of material. The bridge timbers ordered from the Sound have been arriving very slowly, but the material is coming faster now and no further delays are anticipated. The iron was shipped from the east some days ago and will be here when needed. This shipment is coming over the C. P. R., via Kootenai landing. Contractor Skinner, of Spokane was here during the week, looking over the work.

HEYBURN OPPOSES GAME RESERVE

Sounds Note of Alarm against Creation of a 4,000,000 acre Game Reserve.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Senator Heyburn today issued the following declaration regarding the proposition of the game wardens of Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, to create a monster game preserve of 4,000,000 acres in their respective states. The Senator says: "I desire especially to call the attention of the people of Idaho to the threatened danger of the proposed creation of extensive game preserves. It is proposed by a self-constituted convention of game wardens being held at Butte, Mont., that a reserve containing about 4,000,000 acres lying partly in Idaho and partly in Montana shall be created. About two-thirds of this preserve would be in Idaho. The danger from this proposition is more serious than the creation of forest reserves in that it emphasizes the restrictions of forest reserves against either settlement or enjoyment by the people of the state. I desire at this time to sound a note of danger and call for serious consideration of the question by the people of Idaho. There is a sentimental feature connected with this proposition that may appeal more strongly to

to the people of the east than can be estimated. Contemplation of a vast field for recreation and amusement to which they could go in their leisure time will undoubtedly bring strong support to this dangerous measure from that section of the country where people do not feel particularly interested in the building up of our state. Representative French believes the homestead law can not be practically applied to land under the government irrigation projects and will soon introduce a bill amending the law to allow settlers on irrigated lands to either obtain a leave of absence from the time of settlement until the water is turned on, or to make the lands subject to entry on the same terms as land reclaimed under the Carey act. He will also introduce a bill opening the Cœur d'Alene reservation of arid lands in severalty to the Indians. About 300,000 acres of available land will be opened to settlement if this law passes. Mr. French will also introduce bills for several public buildings. Representative French today drew a seat in the extreme rear of the center of the Republican house.

MONSTER MOUNTAIN LION. James McGreevy of the Bonners Ferry Lumber Co. tells of an exciting chase and capture of a Mountain Lion, near their camp No. 2, a few miles out from Bonners Ferry. While driving out to camp Mr. Greevy and one or two others came upon the fresh tracks of the lion in the new snow. The dogs were put upon the trail and chased the animal to the Moyie where it was treed. The hunters came up and shot the lion which proved to be one of the largest of its kind ever killed in this locality, measuring 10 feet, 6 inches from tip to tip.

GRAVE DANGER AVERTED. A bracket supporting a coal oil lamp in the barber shop in the bar room of the Hotel Casey broke yesterday evening, and the lamp fell and burst. The oil caught fire and made a big blaze, but the flames were extinguished, and no damage to speak of resulted. The occasion sent a thrill of terror up and down the street, however, and will suffice as a warning in the unprotected condition of the town. The town has a good fire engine that would be of great service in case of a fire, but there seems to be a lack of interest or encouragement for a volunteer fire department to make use of it. Would it not be well to call a meeting and see if something can not be done to organize for better fire protection?

FOUR INJURED BY BLAST Four Men Reported Killed at Tunnel No. 2 Last Night.

Just as we go to press word reaches us that a terrible accident occurred last night at Tunnel No. 2, four miles east of Bonners Ferry, on the Corbin line, at one of Twoby Bros' camps. Either a premature, or a sleeping blast, went off in the tunnel, and four men are reported killed and several injured. When particulars reached town, it was found that four Italians were seriously injured, but not killed. Starting Work on Bridge.

The sum of \$30,000 has been set aside for the construction of the extension of the ferry approach, so as to provide a bridge across the Kootenai River during the low water season.

A. J. Kent is in charge of the work and will rig up a steam pile driver on the ferry boat. He states that he expects to have the bridge completed in about ten days.

There is sufficient ice in the river to prevent the ferry boat from running and not enough to permit of crossing on the ice, so that traffic across the river is entirely cut off. The need of a bridge can not be overestimated.
