LAYING STEEL ON THE S & I

Laying Rails on the Corbin Line between International Line and Bonners Ferry.

The Spokane & International laid the first rails on their line yesterday, commencing at the International line where they connect with the C. P. R. branch from the Crow's Nest road, rails having been laid on the C. P. R. branch last December. Tracklaying will progress towards Bonners Ferry as fast as conditions will permit, but there will be no great rush for the reason that in places the contractors will not be out of the way, and in others bridges and culverts are to be constructed, causing a delay, and the 900-foot bridge across the Kootenai will not be ready before May 1, at the earliest. As fast as the grade is ready, however, the rails will be laid, and when they are forced to stop by reason of uncompleted work, the work trains will have plenty to do to improve the grade on which rails have been laid.

Construction Notes.

Hastings & Degin, having the first five miles of construction work south of the International line, have completed their contract and the grade is ready for the steel. Breckenridge & Lund have been assisting them in their contract.

M. Tobin, having a 3 1/2 mile contract near the half way house completed his contract a few weeks ago and pulled out for other work.

Breckenridge & Lund, who build the C. P. R. end of the line, and who have been working on Hastings & Degin's contract, are moving their outfit to Laeled, near where they have taken a new contract. Half their outfit passed through Thursday, the other half being expected along the first of next week.

John Kath, who had a small contract, has his work completed.

Twoby Bros., who had a 6 mile contract near Bonners Ferry, including two tunnels aggregating nearly 1000 feet, have completed their tunnel work and steam shovel work, and are winding up the contract.

May & McArthur, having a 4 mile contract above the Moyie bridge, have completed their work.

McDaniels, having the first contract east of the Ferry, will have 60 days work yet. He has a heavy rock out to work out.

John Clark, a passenger conductor from the Cascade division of the N. P., secures the first train on the Corbin road. His engineer is Al Mathewson, for seven years a passenger engineer on the S. F. & N., who gets the first engine. Both are old Corbin men.

There will be a vast amount of work to do after the rails are laid. The finishing touches will be put on by means of steam shovels and work trains.

All the above work is located between Bonners Ferry and the International line. South of Bonners Ferry, as far as Sandpoint, construction is well under way, there being little or no heavy work, and it is probable that that part of the road will be ready for the rails by the time trains get across the Kootenai River.

Steuenberg's Assassination.

The trial of Harry Orchard for the assassination of Ex-governor Steuenberg has been postponed until the April term of the district court at Caldwell. Orchard is now in the penitentiary at Boise for safe keeping. There have been no new developments in the case for some weeks—at least none made public, although a force of the most skillful detectives in the country are working on the case. It is now thought that Orchard had two accomplices who were in Caldwell at the time of the murder. Efforts are being made to apprehend these men. Some legal questions raised by the defense will be disposed of at the present term of court.

Glove Contest.

Kid Forbes and Harry Rogers will meet tonight at the I. O. O. F. Hall in a 15 round boxing match to decide the light-weight championship of the state. The management has announced that the men will enter the ring promptly at 10:30 o'clock and that there shall be no delay or waiting on the arrival of the crowd.

Telephone Lines.

The Corbin people are constructing a telephone line from the Boundary to Sandpoint, where they will connect with a system. The line reached Bonners Ferry yesterday and will be in Sandpoint in two weeks. The construction is temporary, to rush it through, and will be rebuilt later. It is a company line but arrangements will be made whereby the public can be accommodated. D. P. Hanifen is in charge of the construction.

Candidate for District Judge.

Hon. R. N. Dunn, Register of the United States Land Office at Coeur d'Alene, will be a candidate for District Judge to succeed Hon. R. T. Morgan, the present incumbent. Mr. Dunn resided at Wallace, Idaho, until his appointment as Register. He served as County Attorney of Shoshone county, and is a lawyer of ability, with a clean record as a public official, and is a man who enjoys the highest respect of his wide circle of acquaintances, both in Kootenai and Shoshone counties.

Campaign is on.

The calling of the Republican state central committee together serves as a reminder that the campaign is again on. From this time until next November, men anxious to win political honors, or lucrative offices, will be very active.

In Kootenai county two hostile factions have been arrayed against each other and feeling has been very bitter. This condition is charged to be due to Chairman Charles L. Heitman's autocratic sway. But now that Mr. Heitman has announced that he will neither seek nor accept the chairmanship for another term, it ought to follow as a natural consequence that factional lines should be wiped out. This is good logic, but logic and politics do not always jibe, and we doubt if the original discoverer of the alleged cause of the trouble between the two factions will bank to any great extent on this logical consequence.

However, it is nonsense to assume that all intelligence or political virtue is bound up in any one faction. There are good men and men not so good in both factions.

To Repeal Land Laws.

The senate committee on public lands will shortly report a bill for the repeal of the timber and stone laws, and substitute therefore a law authorizing the secretary of the interior to sell to the highest bidder at public outcry or otherwise, under such rules and regulations and subject to such conditions and restrictions and in such quantities as he may prescribe, the right to cut and remove, within such time as he may prescribe, any timber from any unappropriated nonmineral surveyed public lands, chiefly valuable for timber, after first having had such timber duly appraised and after giving public notice of the time, terms, manner and place of such sale.

The bill will give the secretary power to reject all bids.

The bill will repeal the act of congress approved June 3, 1878, and all amendatory acts thereto, providing for the sale of timber lands in the state of California, Oregon, Nevada, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and other western states and prohibiting the patenting in the future of any lands valuable chiefly for timber under the commutation provisions of the homestead laws.

All the funds derived from the sale of the timber and stone in the public land states are to be supplied to the reclamation service, and 10 per cent of the funds derived from the sale of timber and stone in the public land states is to constitute a permanent fund, the interest of which only shall be expended for the support of common schools and the maintenance of public roads in the county in which the timber so sold was located, under such laws as may be prescribed by the legislature of such state.

School Notes.

A set of "Masterpieces of Eloquence", twenty-five volumes, was recently added to the school library. The botany class are studying seeds and seed germination and by the aid of the microscope have been able to secure some very good drawings of seed structure.

The unfinished room in the school building has been provided with a hand-ball court, a set of exercise rings and a trapeze bar as a start toward a gymnasium; Indian clubs have also been ordered.

One hundred sixty-two attendance certificates of pupils, who have been neither absent nor tardy for three months, were forwarded last week to the county superintendent. It is hoped the parents will assist the teacher in making the absent and tardy marks as few as possible.

The total enrollment for the year to date is 154. The fifth grade has been advanced to the grammar room.

Last Friday the literary society enjoyed a debate by the grammar room on the question: "Resolved that the telephone is more useful than the telegraph." Leaders affirmative, Jack VanGaeken and Ella Dolan; negative, Tom Martin and Ada Wood. The decision, by vote, was in favor of the negative.
