

HOW TO IMPROVE OUR CITY.

There are all sorts of men in the world; selfish, semi-selfish, meanly-selfish and generous: A selfish and meanly-selfish man does nothing for a community that he does not get pay for or that he does not expect to get pay for. He is without a generous impulse. A semi-selfish man does many things for a town in an indifferent way, because it is easier to do them than not. It is easier to give a half dollar, which a good-natured man can easily spare, than to refuse a person who asks assistance.

A generous man is always helping somebody; not always with money, more often, perhaps, with good deeds; many times with an encouraging smile and often with a sympathetic word. We saw a specimen of a generous and a selfish man in our city a day or two ago. They both professed to be teachers of morals and Christianity. Both have been employed in one of our literary institutions that was not well able to pay its way. One had worked hard, got a little pay, the other had filled his engagement and received all his pay.

The one who had not received all his pay was hard at work improving the grounds and buildings around him. The other a younger and stronger man had nothing to do, did nothing. Exercise would have been a benefit to him. He said he was an experienced hand at the work needed to be done, but he could see nothing in sight and therefore sat idle. He knew that others were giving time without any pay, raising money to pay him for labor done, but he was too meanly-selfish to donate a stroke of work to benefit the world or the town which supported him. These two men represent a class.

Every man has now and then time to give an hour or day to benefit the city when there is no one to pay him. The generous man does. The selfish man refuses to do so. If our town ever grows its growth will be greatly aided by the generous men in it. Why not all take a hand now and then as leisure affords opportunity, in driving a nail or smoothing a walk, or improving a public building? Let's build up.

THE CLOTHES THAT KILL.

This advice to women to promote their health by out-door exercise is never wanting. But no amount of fresh-air exercise can save women from the evil effects of their present style of dress. It is their clothes that kill them.

Every step a woman takes, her foot contends with her skirt. She lifts it on the instep, and she lifts it on the heel. The weight may be ounces or pounds, but it is taken up at every step. The heavy skirts, with flounces, overskirt, bustle, braid, beads, and other trimmings, hang their many pounds and many yards, flapping around the feet and legs of the wearer. The corset does not allow space to take a full breath, and the tight sleeves causes the muscles to cry for room.

Dressed in this fashion, the wearer comes back from her walk for "fresh air and exercise" tired through and through, and is the worse for it, because she has lifted and carried hundreds of pounds. Stand at any city street corner, and watch the women as they pass. How tired they look! How their dresses flap around them! Contrast them with men. Men's feet lift no weight of clothes. Men's step contend with nothing. Every muscle has its natural exercise. Out-door air and exercise are good for them.

The advice women need is for shorter, lighter and looser dresses. Mrs. Jenness-Miller has not come a day too soon with her better costume, if the health of women is to be improved. Mrs. Celia B. Whitehead has shown "What's the matter." Before her, Mrs. Amelia Bloomer, nearly 40 years ago, set the example of short, loose dresses.

The style was adopted by many women, among them Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Miss Susan B. Anthony, and the present writer. How light and comfortable and neat it was! How easily we went up stairs without stepping on ourselves! How we came down stairs without fear of being stepped on! A walk on a rainy day in a muddy street had no terror, for there were no yards of dragged skirts to clean. We had room to breathe, and freedom for our feet. But this healthful dress was "despised and rejected" by the great public. On one occasion, Miss Anthony, in company with me, started to go to the postoffice in New York, in the Bloomer costume. But we were surrounded and wedged in by a crowd which hooted and jeered. We escaped only by a carriage sent by a friend who saw our dilemma.

It was so difficult to wear this dress, with the odium that was cast upon it, that we returned sorrowfully to the bondage of our bodies for the sake of

freedom to live unmolested. That was long ago. Now women might accept the light, sensible dress which Mrs. Jenness-Miller wears and commends, without fear of unpleasant comment. In it they may take fresh air and exercise, and gain in health. LUCY STONE.
