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League of Commercial Clubs.

The meeting of the League of Southern Idaho commercial clubs held in Boise last week was a great success. Unanimity was the keynote of the convention. The Heyburn amendment to the rate bill, which provides that the railroads shall not receive as much compensation for a short as for a long haul, was endorsed. Numerous other subjects were discussed and proper measures taken, probably the most important of these being the question of advertising southern Idaho. The following is a part of the report of the committee on advertising read and adopted:

"We recommend that the league immediately enter upon such an advertising campaign as has been suggested.

"We recommend that the league send to prospective home seekers literature which shall be published in its own name.

"We recommend that this literature shall consist of one or more books in which each commercial club belonging to this league shall be entitled to two full pages of space and no more, irrespective of the size and wealth of the community represented by that club."

[The Roseberry delegates were responsible largely for the above recommendation, which will give this vicinity the same advertising space that Boise gets with her 250 members.]

Each club is to pay 25 cents per capita per month into the league for advertising purposes. The advertising will be in newspapers and magazines as well as booklets distributed on trains.

A full list of the names of those answering the advertisements will be sent to the different clubs newspapers and irrigation companies of southern Idaho.

A resolution was passed highly commending the efforts of the newspapers of the state in boosting Idaho.

A smoker by the Boise club was highly appreciated by the delegates and demonstrated the club's great ability to entertain.

Secretary Atkinson of the league, in a letter to Secretary Lucas of the club here says: "It is my firm belief that this movement when carried to its ultimate success will make southern Idaho the best advertised state in the union."
