### SOMETHING NEW FOR BABIES

"Better Babies" What an optimistic, captivating sound those two words have! And the best part of it is that they stand for all that their sound suggests, one of the big, interesting, vital ideas of the hour, the Better Babies movement.

It started with the idea of making the old-fashioned baby show a bit more satisfactory by having babies examined for physical perfection instead of dimples, golden ringlets and peaches-and-cream skins. Then a magazine whose editors love babies saw the possibilities of turning this new kind of baby show into a fine, broad campaign for making babies better. And out of it grew the Better Babies Contest.

A Better Babies Contest is a scientific examination of children three years of age and under, for physical and mental development, and the awarding of prizes to those who deserve them, on the grounds of good, all-round development. Good looks, infantile beauty count only for what they are really worth in baby's health and growth, while many more important things count a great deal more.

A fine, healthy, well developed baby may score one thousand points according to the Better Babies Standard Score Card by which all babies are tested. These points are divided as follows: Two hundred for mental and developmental tests, which prove whether baby takes proper notice of what goes on around him, walks, sits and speaks properly and shows a mental growth to correspond to his age. One hundred points for weight and measurements which prove whether well-proportioned baby is for his age. Five hundred for physical development, sturdy bones, firm flesh, smooth skin, good digestion, circulation and respiration. One hundred and fifteen for mouth and teeth. Eighty-five for eye, ear, nose and throat tests.

All of these tests are made by a doctor and it takes a pretty fine baby to score over 90 per cent in this new kind of a baby contest.

Entries for this contest began at 1 o'clock Wednesday at the club rooms in the Odd Fellows Temple. Parents can enter their babies and a time will be assigned them for bringing them for examination. Entries will include babies between the ages of 6 months to 3 years. All examinations will be private and begin at 10 o'clock this, Thursday, morning and continues until 5 o'clock p. m. Entries close at noon Thursday.

#### "EXCUSES."

By Rev. E. N. Quast, Pastor, Luke 14:18-20. The Lord had been invited to dine with a chief of the Pharisees. Not that they had a love for Christ. He was usually their most bitter enemy. Jesus never refused to go wherever he was bidden. "They watched him." Perhaps he would say something that could be interpreted to contradict their traditions or laws. Soon a man with the dropy came in. Perhaps he had come a long distance to seek help from Jesus. His sympathy was always with the sick and the needy. But there were the Pharisees whose traditions forbade any healing on the Sabbath day. He rebuked them by saying: "Which of you shall have an ox or an ass fallen into the pit, and will not straightway pull him out on the Sabbath day?" He then rebuked the guests for trying to secure the most prominent places at the tables and he reminds his host of having forgotten to invite the poor, the halt and the blind. Then he speaks the parable of the great supper, in which he is comparing God to the host and the Jewish nation to the invited guests. "And they all with one consent began to make excuses."

No man has a real excuse for rejecting the invitation of the gospel. The chief first said "I have bought a piece of ground and I must needs go and see it." It is customary to see the land before buying, at any rate, the land would still be there the next day. He got excused from the feast. The next one said, "I have bought five yoke of oxen and go to prove them." What did he gain by trying his oxen, since they were already his? Foolish man to miss the feast for nothing. He was excused. The third man said: "I have married a wife and therefore I cannot come." It is a physical impossibility for a married man to go to a great supper, according to this man. He did not need to ask for an excuse. "I cannot come."

To buy land or oxen, or to get married, are often good excuses for people to reject the invitation of our Heavenly Father to be saved. The host was angry. Can you blame him? A social invitation is sent out "Go out quickly into the streets and lanes of the city and bring in hither the poor and the maimed, and the halt and the blind." No restriction is made. They will all be provided with new robes. The sick will be healed. The Lord is so anxious that he tells his servants to "compel them to come in." Some of them are tired and need to be urged.

The men that value their possessions more than the blessings of heaven, will be excused. You are invited to the feast by the King of Kings. Are you going? You are urged to come.

### ORDINANCE NO. 154.

An Ordinance declaring the intention of the City of Salmon, Idaho to establish within the limits of the said city a local sewerage improvement district to be called Local Sewerage Improvement District No. 4 and the intention of the said city to establish therein a sewerage district.

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Salmon, Idaho: Section 1. That it is the intention of the City of Salmon, Idaho, to establish within the limits of the said city a local improvement district to be called Local Sewerage Improvement District No. 4; and to conduct a lateral sewerage system therein.

Section 2. That the boundaries of the proposed district are as follows, to-wit:

#### DESCRIPTION.

Beginning at the Northeast Corner of Lot 5 Block 4 Salmon City Townsite, run thence S. 27 degrees 55 minutes 20 seconds W., 110.13 ft. to the Southwest corner said lot, thence S. 60 degrees 54 minutes 40 seconds E., 163.71 ft. to the Southeast corner of said lot thence S. 63 degrees 20 minutes 15 seconds E., 132.7 ft. more or less, thence N. 29 degrees 42 minutes 20 seconds E., 150.2 ft. more or less to Northeast corner lot 5, block 7 said townsite, thence N. 28 degrees 39 minutes 20 seconds E., 88.37 ft. to South Boundary sewer District No. 1, said City, thence along the Southern Boundary said Sewer District No. 1, N. 61 degrees 14 minutes 40 seconds W., 183 ft. more or less to the West line of Lot 2, Block 4 said Townsite, thence S. 26 degrees 45 minutes 20 seconds W., 17.83 ft., thence N. 63 degrees 37 minutes 40 seconds, W. 48.02 ft. thence S. 28 degrees 30 minutes 20 seconds W., 80.50 ft. to the Northeast Corner of Lot 3, Block 4 said Townsite, thence S. 27 degrees 06 minutes 20 seconds W., 33.13 ft., to Southeast Corner said Lot 3, thence N. 59 degrees 15 minutes 40 seconds W., 61.82 ft. to place of beginning.

Said tract just described contains the following pieces or parcels of land in said Salmon City Townsite, to-wit:—

All of Lots 5, and 4 in Blk. 4, part of Lot 2, Block 4.

All of Lot 5, Block 7, and part of Lots 1 and 6, Block 7.

All said property and lines and all said sewerage district being in the City of Salmon, Lemhi County, Idaho.

Section 3. That the character of the said proposed lateral sewerage system shall be that of gravity and according to the plans and specifications now on file in the office of the City Engineer of the City of Salmon, which said plans and specifications show in detail the location of said sewerage system, the street along which the pipes will be laid, the size of the pipes, material of which constructed and the general character of the system which said plans and specifications afford a complete and detailed description of the entire said system and all materials to be used, to which said plans and specifications any interested person shall have free access.

Section 4. The estimated cost of the said Improvement District is the sum of One Thousand Dollars.

Section 5. That all the costs and expenses in and about the construction of the said sewer above mentioned are to be assessed against all the property included within such sewerage district:

PROVIDED, however, that all the costs and expense of the sewerage improvements made in the spaces formed by the junction or intersection of streets and avenues and in the spaces opposite alleys in the said

district, shall be borne by the owners of said property abutting upon, contiguous or contributory to, said intersection, and shall be a lien upon said property the same as any other assessment against said property in said district.

Section 6. That protests against the establishment of said Local Sewerage Improvement District No. 4, in this ordinance provided, may be filed with the City Clerk of the City of Salmon, Idaho, before eight o'clock P. M. on the third day of October, 1914, at which time any and all protests will be heard by the Mayor and Council of said City.

This ordinance is enacted for the purpose of ratifying, confirming, validating and making legal any and all acts heretofore done in the construction of the said sewer and the establishment of said sewerage district and to legally assess the costs of the same as above provided.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and first publication.

Passed and approved this 21st day of September, 1914.

#### A Universe of Suns, Not of Clouds.

The latest studies on the subject of the probable number of stars have been made at the Royal Observatory at Greenwich in England. The late Franklin Adams succeeded in making a set of two hundred and six photographs covering the whole sky.

Counts have been made of these pictures of the heavens and from them and certain other facts it is reasoned by the astronomers that the aggregate number of stars is probably not less than one billion, not more than two billions, and approximately about one billion, six hundred million. By a singular coincidence this is the same number as that of the present population of the earth. So that every person living on this planet has a star shining for him—his own particular star if he wishes so to think of it.

When it is considered that all these stars are flaming suns like our sun, and that each may have its following of planets in the vast sky as our own sun has, and that many of these planets may be the abodes of life similar to that found on this earth, the thought becomes so vast that the mind is staggered by the possibilities.

How small and fleeting are the little clouds that seem to make gloomy our day, when we look out over this immense Universe far-shining with its billions of lamps and their suns, trains of worlds. On the other side of every cloud in this entire Universe, be know that some sun is shining and making things beautiful.

In this thought lies a good reason for taking the longer look out for ceasing our small complaints and musing our petty griefs. The law of the Universe is light and not darkness, and it should be our duty and joy to take our stand with the light and trust the Father of Light with whom is no darkness nor shadow of turning.
