## COMMENCEMENT

### THE KENDRICK HIGH SCHOOL Seven Graduates and a Good Program

The commencement exercises last Friday evening at the K. of P. hall was among the best that Kendrick has had and the class was of the largest. There were seven graduates, five young ladies and two young men. The names of the graduating class were, Lillian Davis, Bessie Pemberton, Amanda Johnson, Halle Hill, Elba McGrew, Henry Judd and Oakley Hall. The stage was most beautifully decorated with flowers and the class colors, the class motto extending across the front in bold lettering, while the hall was decorated with bunting and a number of beautiful flags. The hall was packed to suffocation, a number not being able to find even standing room. About 8:30 p. m. the members of the graduating class followed by the school board, the teachers and the citizens of the town, took their places on the platform and the exercises commenced with a chorus, "Idaho" which was followed by an instrumental solo by Miss Elba McGrew entitled, "The Louisiana Purchase Exposition March" which was well rendered. After the invocation by Rev. W. I. Mitchell a quintet composed of members of the class consisting of Lillian Davis, Halle Hill, Bessie Pemberton, Amanda Johnson and Elba McGrew and assisted by Miss Maud Brillhart and Miss Emerson sang a sweet song entitled "Source of every blessing." Then came a recital "Our Country" by Henry Judd which was delivered in an effective manner. The next number brought down the house it being a song and march by "The Brownies," consisting of a number of boys of the primary room dressed up as brownies. They showed that they had been well drilled and were loudly applauded. The Oration, "The New Celebration," by Oakley Hall showed careful thought and preparation and was delivered in such a manner as to show the nature gifts of an orator. Then followed the "Flag Salute" by the school and after this the class quintette sang another beautiful song, "Beautiful Streamlet." Perhaps the most amusing number of the evening was the song, "The Crows," by three boys dressed like the birds of which they sang and seated on the back of a chair. It was well and humorously rendered and created much laughter. The diplomas were then distributed to the several members of the graduating class by the president of the school board, Dr. A. Hunter, after a neat speech in which he congratulated the class in having completed their course so successfully and complimenting the conduct of the school during the past year. Two received diplomas on graduating from the eighth grade, Joy McGrew and Eddie Atchinson. The exercises were then closed with a chorus by the school and the benediction by Rev. J. A. Hedges. Saturday evening the class address was given by Prof. Snow, professor of English literature and oratory in the Washington Agriculture College at Pullman. This address was listened to by a fair sized audience and was exceedingly practical as well as eloquent. The speaker went on to show the greater possibilities that lay before the young people of the west than those of the east, by reason of the great development going on, and the need of preparing for the actual duties of life. But he also warned against the too practical view of life which is fastening itself upon us and urged the cultivation of that higher form of culture which has to do with the aesthetic side of our nature. The lecture was free and it was a pity there were not more out to hear it. We hope we shall have the pleasure of hearing Prof. Snow again.

The Baccalaureate sermon was preached Sunday morning before a large congregation at the Presbyterian church by the pastor, Rev. J. A. Hedges. This concluded the three days program and the class has now launched forth on a new year. We are

not informed as to the future intentions of the several members of the class but the Gazette hopes and trusts that they will go on to the higher things and fit themselves for great usefulness in the world.

For the benefit of the school patrons and also that everyone may see what monies were secured and for what expended, Prof. Barackman has given us a list of the receipts and expenditures of the occasion which we gladly publish and in this instance it might be well to add that his own work, time and money is not included. The thanks of this district and of the parents is most assuredly due the Professor and his assistants and we know they have it. The policy of giving a financial statement of public matters is a commendable one and we believe should always be done:—
