City Council Meets Twice

The council met in called session Saturday evening August 22. All the members were present and after the reading and approval of minutes of previous meeting. The report of the committee on Police, Health and Fire was read. The report recommended the abolishment of the office of night watch. The report was adopted and the night watchman discharged, the clerk being ordered to draw up a warrant for \$29.33, the amount due him for services.

The clerk was instructed to notify J. F. Brown to deliver the last bill of lumber ordered from him immediately. The council then adjourned.

The city council met in called session Monday evening August 24 with all the members present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The chair introduced Mr. Evans who spoke in behalf of the water company as to the repairing of the city mains, throwing the responsibility of such repairing on the village. He also made a proposition relative to the construction of a reservoir for fire purposes by the village. After Mr. Evans had spoken the council took up the discussion of the question as to whether the city or the company should keep the hydrants in repair. No conclusion was reached and the council adjourned.
