Not being able to give our readers the full message of President Roosevelt to this congress, we give a synopsis of his recommendations. Of course the message enters more fully into the details but this is the gist of it. We refrain from comment until we have had time to study the document more fully and to secure the meaning of as well as the comparison of acts, versus words—

Corporations—Congratulation a result in secured supervision.

Capital and labor—Favors strict security of individual rights by federal action.

Government receipts and expenditures—Favors economy in the appropriations.

Finance—Favors no reconstruction of system, but repeats previous recommendations.

Merchant Marine—Favors appointment of a commission to investigate as regards expansion, such committees to report to con-

gress. Immigration—Favors keeping out undesirable immigrants entirely. Recommends immediate action in providing more strict naturalization laws.

Trusts and Inter-State Commerce—Recommends extension of appropriation to enforce laws applying thereto.

Postoffice Frauds—Favors appropriation to be made immediately available to enable prosecution to be carried on.

Alaskan Boundary—Compliment work of the commission.

International Arbitration—Favors encouraging it in every way.

Private property—Favors its exemption from capture in time of war.

Relations with Turkey—States they are friendly.

Relations with China—States signing of Shanghai treaty is cause for congratulation.

Rural Delivery Service—Favors its extension.

Expositions—Favors earnest national support to Louisiana purchase and Lewis and Clark exhibitions.

Hawaii—Favors giving governor additional powers.

Philippines and Porto Rico—Favors closer tariff arrangements.

Public Lands—Favors radical revision of the laws, and prevention of all unlawful enclosures of lands.

Irrigation—Favors no change in present laws.

Forest Reserves—Favors vigorous perpetuation of policy of extension.

Indian Affairs—Favors isolation of Indian agents from political control.

Patents to Foreigners—Favors reciprocal rights.

Pensions—Calls attention to the expeditious work of the depart-

ment. Navy—Favors no let up in building, and urges immediate establishment of naval base in the Philippines.

Isthmian Canal—Favors immediate ratification by congress of action taken by the administration.

Army—Favors securing permanent camp sites for military maneuvers and favors modification of rules of promotion.
