In this issue of the Record is found an article touching of the bean industry here, one of the greatest of Filer's many assets. Reliable statistics are quoted showing that \$415,000 is being paid out here this season by the bean companies, with only 75 per cent of normal yield.

This is the fifth of a series of articles dealing with the resources of the Filer country. The preceding articles dealt with the Twin Falls County Fair, the Brunau Project, Filer's Beet Sugar Factory, and Our School System, with Prospects of an Agricultural College. Succeeding articles will deal with Filer as a Wheat Shipping Point, a Bridge Across Snake River North of Filer, the Clover Crop in this Section, Apples and Fruits, the Moran District, and a variety of other subjects.

The want ad column of the Record is proving of real benefit to many advertisers. I am in receipt of yours of the 29th ulto, and am glad to note that the Commissioners of the Filer Highway District are satisfied that all that can be done is being done in prosecuting the project statement covering road construction through your district. I am sorry that the Commissioners have been criticized for the delay. I know that we have never expected that it would be possible to get this project through in time to do much, if any, this fall, but it will undoubtedly be possible to let the contract during the winter and have everything lined up for an early start in the spring.

My reason for writing you as I did was because it had been reported to me that the different districts in Twin Falls County desired to withdraw from Federal and State cooperation and proceed with the work on their own account. I am very glad to know that this is not the case, and beg to assure you that everything possible will be done to have construction begun at as early a date as possible.

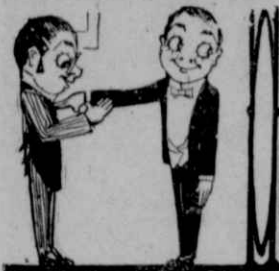
