REPUBLICANS TAKE OFFICE.

New Corps of County Officials Take Charge of Offices.

The new corps of county officials were sworn in last Monday morning. A. M. Carter the retiring county clerk, administered the oath of office to George A. Cordon, who then took charge of the inauguration of the other officers. Mr. Cordon swore in Messrs. Costley and Little and the board of county commissioners was then organized with Mr. Cordon as chairman. The oath was administered to the new county clerk, Victor Hegsted and his deputy, Ernest Bramwell, who immediately thereafter entered upon their official duties. Assessor and collector Clay, Treasurer Borrows, Sheriff Harrop, Probate Judge Donaldson, County Superintendent Taylor and Coroner Harris were each in turn sworn to perform the constitution and do their duty as county officers.

After the rush of business was over, Sheriff Harrop appointed Win Ricks of Rexburg, deputy sheriff, and his

name was added to the list of newly installed officers.

County Attorney-elect O. P. Soule not being able to appear for installation, Attorney J. D. Millsaps continued as the advisor for the new board and will act as county attorney until such time as Mr. Soule's health will permit him to enter upon the duties of the office.

The board assisted by Attorney Millsaps devoted the afternoon to the approving of the various officers' bonds, and Tuesday morning the regular routine of business was taken up and the new officers were busily engaged at their posts and one who was unfamiliar with the various officials would think that they had worked at their respective jobs all their lives so accurate and speedy were they in the discharge of the numerous matter which had accrued during the transfer of the county administration.

Smelter for Sand Point, Idaho.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 9.—The Panhandle Smelting and Refining company has secured 400 acres of land at Sand Point, Idaho, as a site for the smelter which it is stated the company intends to construct this year. The company proposes to construct a 300 ton smelter ultimately but will start with one furnace. It has also purchased a line of three steamboats on Lake Peopel's and has bought the Venezuela group of mining claims which it is proposed to operate in connection with the smelter.

Active Volcano Discovered in Utah.

A partly active volcano has just been discovered by prospectors about twenty miles north of Moab, Utah. On a high mesa the prospectors discovered steam or smoke rising some distance from where they were and on investigation

found that it rose from a hole in the solid sandstone formation. The orifice is oblong, about three feet in width and six feet long.

A strong current of warm air carrying some vapors arises but seems to have little or no gaseous smell. The sides of the hole are very black and sooty. A rock thrown in apparently falls a long distance. The prospectors working in that section will make further investigation.

This section has been prospected over for a number of years, and cattle and sheepmen have ridden over it for the past twenty-five years without discovering the orifice. The prospectors who visited it say they would not have found it but for seeing the steam arise, as it is in a place that would be unlikely to be passed. It appears to be an old volcanic vent that has been lying dormant for years and is just beginning to show signs of activity.

Rich Appointed.

Ex-Deputy Sheriff Dave Rich received word last night that he had been appointed traveling guard for the state penitentiary for the next two years. Mr. Rich was an aspirant for the state game wardenship but owing to Governor Morrison's opposition to that office it will be abolished.

Ignorance of English Officials.

A story relating to the war office here is being told in Laramie. An officer, on a holiday in Idaho, the name of Trane, Ivan in Russian, and he reported the fact to his consular officer he had occasion to write the war office and he had his letter Grand Hotel, Klausenberg, this being the German name of the town. Almost by return of post came a letter from the authorities asking why he dared go from Kolozsar to Klausenberg without having necessary clearance permission.
