MINING IN OWYHEE COUNTY

At the Potosi three machine drills are kept on development work and two on ore. The mill is kept running steadily. All outside work is being rushed to get everything under cover before the winter sets in.

In addition to the three ledges mentioned, which have been very thoroughly prospected, there are three or four other leads which may be spurs from the main leads, or depth may prove them to be also separate veins.
