FOOD WILL WIN THE WAR

DESERTED FROM POLISH CONTINGENT

Whiting Men After Enlisting Get Cold Feet and Return Home.

(Special to The Times.)

WHITING, IND., March 12.—Three deserters were arrested in Whiting Monday night after having deserted the ranks of the Polish army. They were Joseph Sluder, 25; Peter Sluder, 27, and Joseph Lesniak, age 29 years, Austrian poles.

The men were recruits for the Polish army from Whiting and were sworn in at Whiting, after which they went to Chicago where they took their final oaths, received all the knitted goods and various other gifts together with funds from the Polish people of this city. When the large aggregation was ready to leave Chicago for Canada from where they go directly "over there" to fight with our allies the men became affected with "cold feet" and the trio deserted. Since then the officers have been looking for them. A clue was secured to the effect that the two brothers and Lesniak were employed at the Standard Oil Co. here. Last night Lieut. Stanley Wosinski, Corporal Nicholas Stoczynski of the Polish army and John Tokarz, sergeant of the local recruiting station, appeared at the police station and took out warrants for the men. They were arrested by Officer Mullaney and turned over to the army officers who took them back to Chicago where they will stand trial for desertion.

LETTER FROM SOLDIER; THEN NEWS OF DEATH

Gary Lad Killed in France Is Word Received in Aetna.

Shortly after R. C. Holsinger of the Aetna gunnery works got a letter from Michael Sullivan of Gary, a soldier with Pershing, saying he was well there came a wire telling of the latter's death in France.

Soldier Sullivan was one of the first Gary boys to enlist. He was employed at the Washburn depot at Gary and for several months was night agent at the Aetna depot.

No details of the death came with the sad news received by Mrs. Holsinger.

After this he will take six weeks more training at the end of which time he expects to be sent directly to France.

GARY ORDNANCE CO. PROBABLE SUBSIDIARY

Belief Is That Gun Works Built By Bridge Co. Is Owned by U. S. Steel.

While all information as to its ownership is obscured it is said that the new Gary Ordnance company is really a subsidiary of the steel corporation.

The Gary Ordnance company, soon ready to turn out heavy artillery for Pershing, is located at Ambridge. Its plant, nearly completed, is being built by the American Bridge company, also of the steel trust.

The other gun works is that of the Standard Forging company at Indiana Harbor, which is about to set 1,500 men to work turning out huge cannons.
