

DRYS SEEK TO
AID BOOTLEGGERS
AND SALOONMAN

But Withdraw Petition on
His Behalf when His
Record Is Read.

In the enforcement of the Reed amendment and the Indiana prohibition law unpopular with even the "dry" element in Lake county?

That is a question puzzling federal authorities today following an effort by the Civic department of the Hammond's Women's Club to intercede on behalf of an ex-saloonkeeper and convicted bootlegger of East Hammond.

The women had been told that the former saloonman as unjustly sentenced by Judge Anderson and that his family in East Hammond was suffering. They appealed to local federal authorities to have the man released from his sentence so that he could come back to his family (and resume bootlegging).

When the bootlegger's record was read to them they withdrew their oral petition.

It is a fact, however, that U. S. agent George Green of the Department of Justice, Charles Surprise, U. S. Commissioner, and their men employed in running down liquor violators have not had the assistance of the "drys" who spent their time previous to the passage of the prohibition bill in campaigning against whiskey. These prohibitionists who moved heaven and earth to get the state in the dry column are doing nothing to help keep it there and make prohibition a success.

On the other hand the most efficient volunteer workers, the federal men have had is an ex-saloonkeeper while all of the aids are the "liberal type." The ffs that are telephoned to "Hammond 2418" come from "wets." The "drys" have offered a hand or a congratulation.

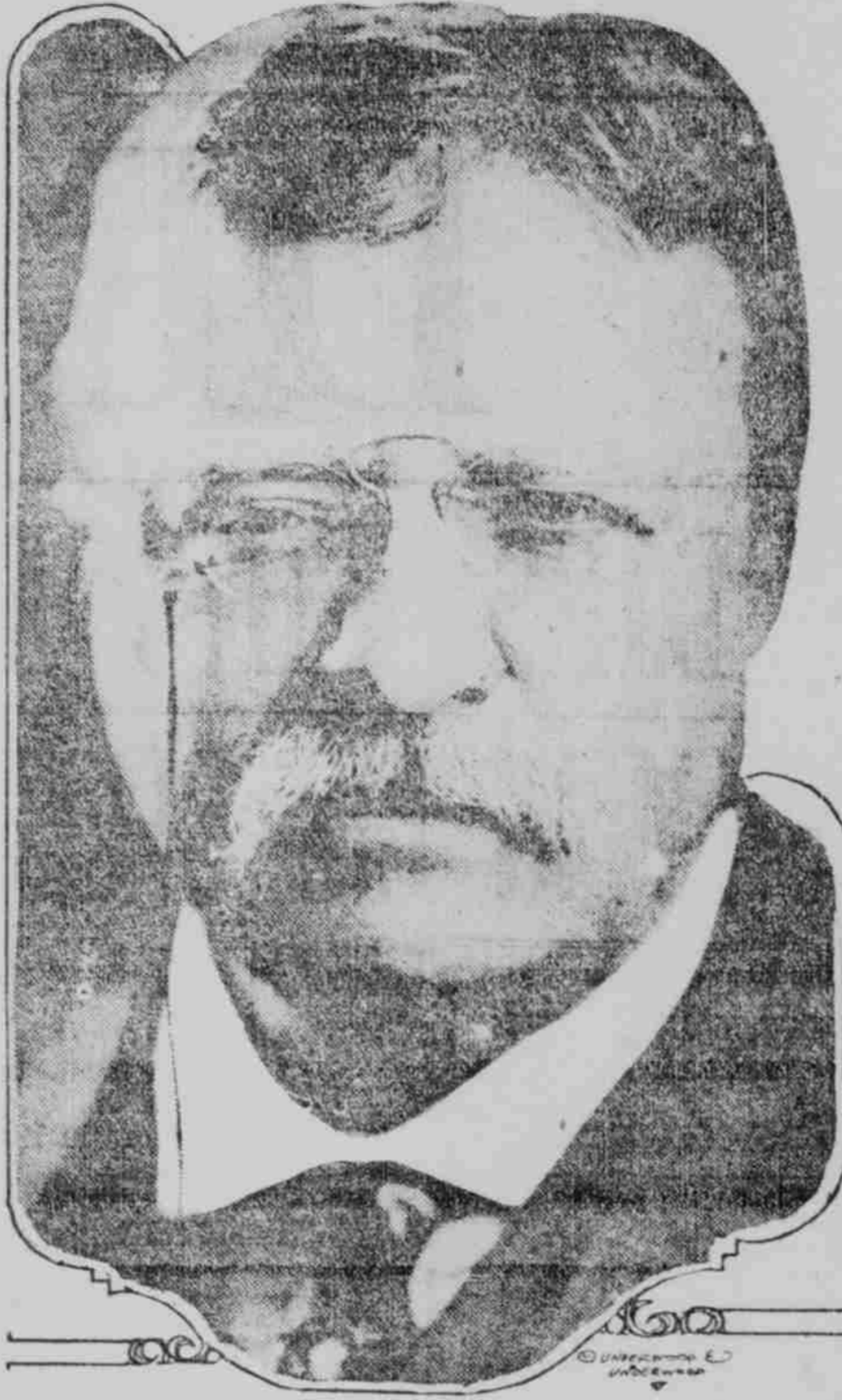
