Goshen News

Four Goshen men—A. C. Brown, Roscoe Method, Wilson Greenhaus and Barney Graves, are confined in the Noble county jail at Albion awaiting the assistance of friends to get them out of the difficulty into which they got themselves while racing in an automobile several miles south of Albion.

The four men went into Albion Monday night from "somewhere in Ohio," (Hialeah) and after spending a part of the night in the town they started south, presumably for Columbia City. Two miles south of town they ran their speedster into a Ford and a Dodge, the former belonging to Dewey Hiatt of Albion, and the latter to a man in Kendallville. Miss Jessie Spear, who was riding with Hiatt, suffered severe bruises, but will recover.

The four men were arrested and fined \$32.85. Unable to pay they were sent to jail. Twelve quarts of whisky were taken from the car.

Dr. John H. Bowser, 58 years old, for nearly 35 years a widely known Syracuse practicing physician, died suddenly at his home there at 10:15 o'clock Monday morning of heart ailment, with which he was seized while sweeping the hall and porch at the residence. He expired two hours after being attacked.

This morning Dr. Bowser seemed in his usual health. He and his son, Philip, a student at Indiana university, drove in a motor car to Milford, where the son took the 7:15 Big Four train for Bloomington, Ind., he having been on a vacation. The doctor returned to his Milford residence, and soon after starting sweeping the porch was stricken. He fell in an unconscious condition, and never rallied.

Surviving are his wife, three sons and two brothers.

Suit will soon be filed in the circuit court by John W. Nihart of Goshen, painter and decorator, whose wife was killed by a New York Central switch engine at the Middlebury st. crossing in Elkhart several months ago, and who sustained severe injuries himself, against the railroad company, as all endeavors to reach a settlement have failed. Mr. Nihart states that the company offered to settle with him for the sum of \$300. He has retained Anthony Deal as legal adviser. The action will be based on the grounds that the company failed to properly guard the crossing.

The Indiana state pardon board considered the appeal for clemency for Lewis Fuller of Goshen, wife murderer. Lou W. Gall, Goshen lawyer, has filed a protest against the release. B. F. Schaefer, Goshen attorney, is to appeal for Fuller. The board also is to hear an appeal for Charles Werner, who embezzled Goshen Moose lodge funds, and against whose release W. C. Peters, secretary of the Elkhart council of defense, has protested.

John W. Wingringham, 76 years old, a Civil war veteran, died at his Elkhart residence of Bright's disease. He had long been a resident of this city.

Widow of St. Louis Brewer on Way Home in U. S. From Germany.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—All the property in this country of Mrs. Adolphus Busch of St. Louis, valued at millions of dollars, was ordered seized Monday by Allen Property Custodian Palmer.

Mrs. Busch has recently been in Germany and is now in Cuba en route to the United States.

The property consists largely of breweries in St. Louis and many other cities throughout the country.

Allen Property Custodian Palmer announced today that the seizure of the estate was made some months ago, and that the Union Trust Co. of St. Louis had been named as depository and has been operating the property for the government.

Under the alien property law which permits the government to seize the property in this country of any person resident in Germany, title to the entire estate reverted to the government, and unless the attorney general rules otherwise, it will be held subject to such disposition as the government may choose to make of it.

Mrs. Busch, who is 74 years old, was in Havana over Sunday on her way to the United States from Germany, through Switzerland and Spain. She is accompanied by her attorney, Harry D. Hawes, who went to Switzerland to confer with her several months ago. It is understood that Mrs. Busch plans upon her arrival in this country, to call at the state department and the department of justice in an effort to regain custody of her estate.

Insists She is Loyal to U. S. It is understood that Mrs. Busch will insist that she is a loyal citizen of the United States who did not forfeit her citizenship by reason of her residence in Germany since her husband's death.

Mr. Hawes in a recent statement, denied that Mrs. Busch had contributed a large sum to the German hospital service, and indicated that her former residence in this country had indicated the loyalty of the family in making large contributions to the American Red Cross and heavy subscriptions to the Liberty loans.

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Religious Belief No Excuse For Law Violation

NEW YORK, June 18.—Religious belief is no excuse for violating the law, according to a statement made in the federal court here Monday by Judge Howe at the trial of Joseph F. Rutherford, who succeeded Pastor Russell as head of the International Bible Students' association, and his seven associates, charged with opposing the war policies of the government by the circulation of alleged seditious literature.

Reading court opinions to the effect that religious belief did not offset the constitution, Judge Howe said that he would call this fact to the attention of the jury during the trial. In a tilt with counsel for the defense he said that he was amazed the lawyer should hold the opinion that the religious belief of the defendants justified them "in evading the law."

Ordered Russell's Book Suspended. Rutherford, called to the stand, described how, after practicing law in St. Louis and New York, he had succeeded "Pastor" Russell in 1915. Last March he said he had asked Atty. Gen. Gregory and the department of justice to point out passages in the Finish Mystery, "Pastor" Russell's posthumous book, to which the government took exception. Although he did not obtain exact answer, he said he ordered the publication and sale of the book suspended.

Asked if he believed in the draft, he replied that in his youth it was his ambition to lead an army, "but according to the tenets of our organization, it is against our principles to fight, and on that ground alone I am opposed."

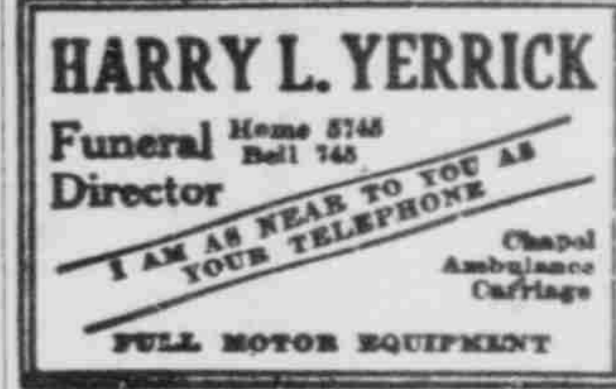

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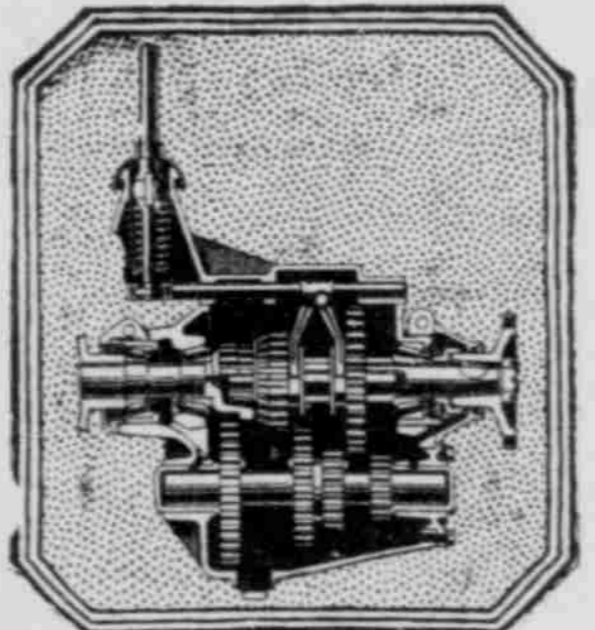
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
