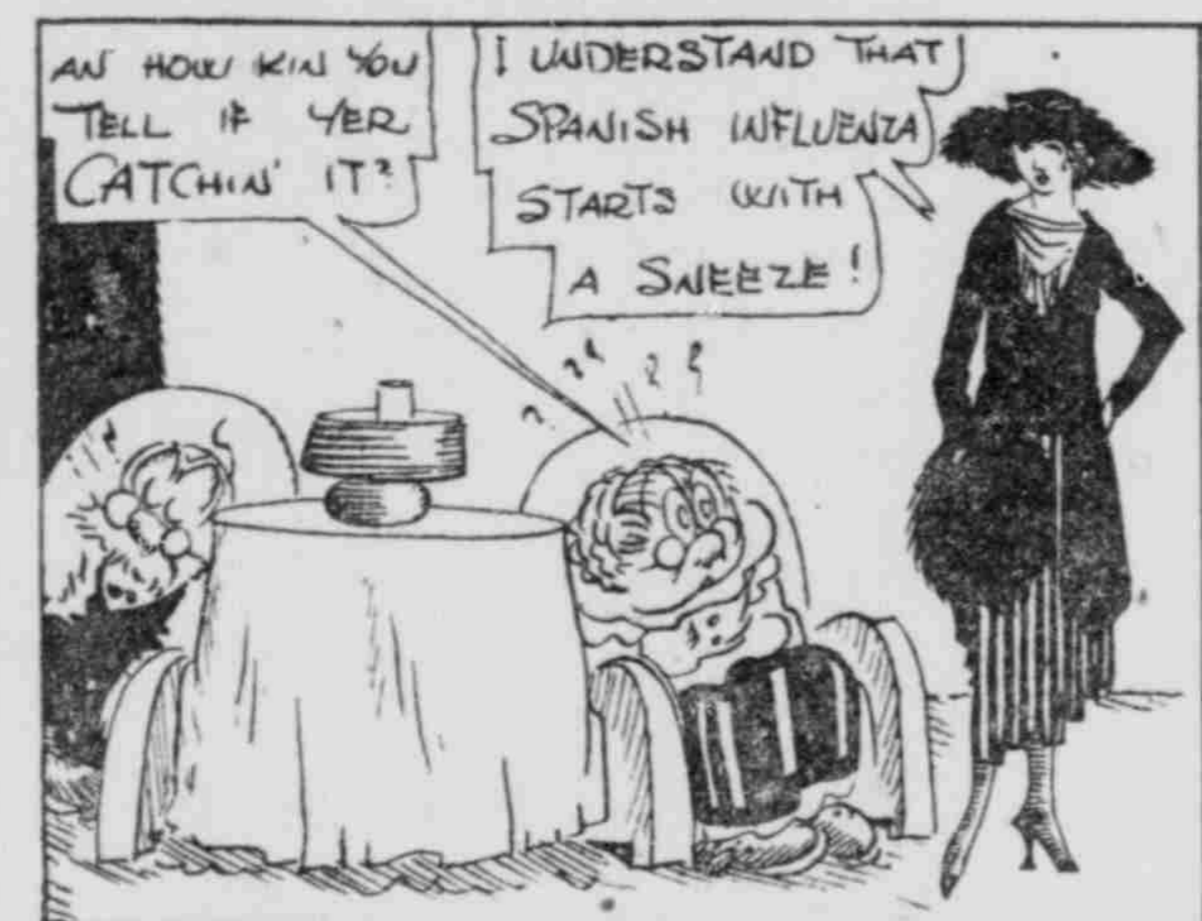

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150 ARE KILLED BY EARTHQUAKE IN PORTO RICO

Because of Broken Communication Reports From Interior of Island are Coming in Slowly.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Oct. 14.—One hundred and fifty lives were lost in yesterday's earthquake in Porto Rico, it was estimated by Gov. Yager today.

There are unconfirmed reports here of great damage in Santo Domingo from the earthquake.

The greatest loss of life from yesterday's shock was at Mayaguez and Aguadilla, west coast cities, and in the intervening territory.

The known dead at Mayaguez are given as 40, and at Aguadilla 30, with the numbers rapidly increasing.

At Ponce, on the south coast, the known dead are reported to be seven and the injured 11.

Churches, hospitals, schools and public buildings everywhere suffered the greatest damage.

The Red Cross and the insular government have authorized the use of all the funds that may be needed.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 14.—While the name of Gen. Allenby, the victorious British general in Palestine, has no more meaning to the Americans and English than the name of any other good general, to the Turks it is horrifying in meaning.

Mr. Ashjian says the Turks do not want to pronounce Gen. Allenby's name correctly, but the more they have twisted it the worse its meaning has become.
