

DEMOCRATS ELECT

Montgomery, Schwartz, Keller, Truax, McClellan, Beebe, Hepler, Wypiszynski, Voorde, Hanley, Gunderman and Beyer.

Complete official returns from all of the 53 precincts in the county as canvassed by the board of election commissioners, show the election of seven democrats to county offices, one democratic state senator, and five democratic township candidates.

The canvassing board completed its work at 11 o'clock Wednesday night of canvassing the vote in Tuesday's election. The returns from the second precinct in Olive township was the last to come in. Sheriff Bailey had to be sent to the precinct late Wednesday afternoon before the returns from there could be obtained.

The vote from this precinct added 17 votes generally to the democratic candidates, but it did not materially affect the result of the count.

Montgomery and Duck Lead.
Chester R. Montgomery, successful democratic candidate for the superior court judgeship, led the entire ticket in the county, receiving more votes than even that of Congressman Barnhart. Montgomery

defeated Lenn J. Oare, republican, by 681 votes.

L. M. Duck led the republican county ticket, leading Congressman-elect Hickey by a substantial margin.

G. Y. Hepler, democratic candidate for state senator, defeated Edgar S. Anderson, republican, by 482 votes.

Schwartz Defeats Pattee.
Samuel P. Schwartz, democratic candidate for prosecutor, defeated C. E. Pattee, republican, by a majority of 184 votes. Edward F. Keller, democrat, defeated C. W. Cole, republican, for county treasurer, by 398 majority. Henderson

McClellan, democrat, won out over George H. Leslie, republican, for county surveyor, by 153 votes. Roscoe Truax, democrat, was re-elected county assessor over his opponent, Martin Mochel, republican, by 52 majority. E. Beebe, democrat, was elected county commissioner for the eastern district over Dr. S. Crull by 150 votes.

The republicans elected the three lower house legislative candidates, these candidates being Arthur W. Barnard, C. B. Byers and Francis M. Hamilton.

The official returns give Congressman Barnhart's majority in the county over Andrew J. Hickey, the successful republican candidate for congress, as 484.

Punk is Re-elected.
Judge Punk defeated his democratic opponent, F. M. Jackson, for the circuit court judgeship, by 735 majority, and Wilbur M. Warner won out over George Raab, democrat, for county clerk, by 86 votes.

In the race for county auditor, Clarence Sedgwick, republican, defeated Arthur Wolfe, democrat, for reelection, by 35 majority. John A. Swanson, republican, defeated Bert Klisz, democrat, for county recorder by a majority of 367 votes.

Sheriff-elect Duck, republican, defeated his democratic opponent, Frank Nieszgodski, by 873 votes, the largest majority received by any candidate in the county in Tuesday's election. E. P. Wagner, republican,

defeated H. Helman, democrat, for corner by 466 majority.

Township Democrats.
In the township contests the democrats elected Michael Hanley trustee, over Samuel Krueger, republican, by 746 majority, and Joseph Voorde assessor over Henry Swartz by 662 majority. One democratic and one republican justice of the peace was elected. Joseph V. Wypiszynski, democrat, and M. W. Hosinski, republican, being the successful candidates for this office. Andrew Gunderman and Robert Beyer, democrats, were the successful candidates for the office of constable, defeating Walter Martin and Fred Hamilton, republicans.

The state democratic ticket led throughout in the county, the democratic candidates for state offices receiving in the neighborhood of 100 majority.

OHIO IS IN DRY STATE COLUMN

Wets are Behind 30,000 Thus Far—Willis Concedes Cox's Election.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—Ohio yesterday entered the fast growing column of states where intoxicating liquors cannot be sold or purchased. With the reports from rural counties returned today showing such a marked tendency toward the dry amendment it became evident early that the 50,000 wet that the wets had obtained would be overcome and predictions to this effect proved true. The prohibition forces confidently predict that the final majority will be close to 15,000.

With a little more than 250 precincts missing, Gov. Cox, democrat, has established a lead of 18,768 over his republican opponent, Frank B. Willis, and the latter has conceded his opponent's election. Returns to the secretary of state's office today, however, indicated that the state house would have a divided body, as almost the entire state republican ticket has been elected.

The republicans also supported their congressional nominees in a manner that realized the hopes of their leaders. The Ohio delegation in congress will consist of 14 republicans and eight democrats, whereas last election 13 democrats and nine republicans were elected.

While returns from the rural districts are slow, the indications point to a democratic state senate and house of representatives.

LATE REPORTS CUT INTO NEWBERRY LEAD

DETROIT, Nov. 7.—The senatorial race in Michigan between Lieut. Commander Truman H. Newberry, republican, and Henry Ford, democrat, was still undecided late tonight and the official count may be required to determine the result. With 273 precincts to be heard from Newberry maintained a lead of 3,552. The missing precincts, most of them in rural districts, are normally republican, but late reports have cut sharply into Newberry's advantage. Wayne county, (Detroit) gave Ford a majority of 27,128.

Gov. Alber A. Sleeper and the entire republican state ticket was returned by comfortable majorities and woman's suffrage apparently was carried by about 17,000 votes.

WORLD NOTORIOUS CROOK SHOT TO DEATH

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Edward Joseph Fay, a world notorious crook and bank robber, known as "Eddie Fay," was found shot to death in an alley here today. There was a bullet wound in his head just below the right ear. The police believe he was slain by a member of his own gang following an argument over the division of loot.

Fay's career of crime extends all over America and parts of Europe. The police estimate that Fay has stolen more than \$2,000,000 from banks throughout the country.

ENTENTE ARMY OFFERS PASSAGE TO AUSTRIANS

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 7.—Entente troops, in agreement with the Austro-Hungarian army command have crossed the Austro-Hungarian lines at several points to offer passage to the troops which have not as yet fled, according to a Vienna dispatch. This action was taken to prevent a further disbandment of the troops and permit them to be transported home in groups.

VON BUELOW PLEADS TO RETAIN EMPEROR

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 7.—The semi-official Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin publishes an article written by Prince von Buelow, the former German imperial chancellor, in which he pleads for the retention of Emperor William. The prince says he considers the emperor's advocacy of the new order of things in Germany is sincere.

COL. BASS DIES

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Col. Edgar Wales Bass, U. S. A., retired, at one time professor of mathematics at the United States military academy, and assistant astronomer with the United States transit of Venus, died at his home here today in his 76th year.

Italians Holding Land, Guarantee Against Uprising

ROME, Nov. 7.—The conditions of the armistice between the entente nations and Austria are being carried out without delay. Italian troops have begun to occupy the territory which will be held as a guarantee that the agreement will be observed.

A Jugo-Slav commission arrived at Venice today, accompanied by Admiral Marzolo of the Italian navy. It proceeded straight to Padua, where it was received by Gen. Diaz, commander-in-chief of the Italian armies.

The ministry of marine announced that Italian naval units occupied the ports of Dulcigno and Antivari, Montenegro.
