machines which are being installed in laundromats. License fee for each establishment shall be \$100.00 for each calendar year or any portion of that year. An additional fee of twenty dollars will be charged for each machine.

The establishments shall be housed in single-story buildings with concrete floors, with no part of the building to be used as a dwelling.

Prior to opening for operation the premises and plant shall be inspected by the building commissioner, sanitary and fire chief of the village.

The law provides that sep-

arate areas shall be maintained for customer service and the maintenance of machines.

The law prescribes proper ventilation precautions and the construction of ventilation equipment.

An attendant shall be on duty at all times while the business is opened. Any clothes that still have the odor of the solvent in them must be reported to the attendant and a sign so stating must be posted and should advise that said clothes are dangerous if placed in enclosed places.

The machines which cannot
