TEXAS PAID ON THE P. & E. I. R. R. Yesterday afternoon, R. R. Cable, Esq., President of the Peoria & Rock Island Railway, paid County Treasurer Porter \$7,543 35—being the amount of delinquent taxes of that road due this county for the years 1873-4-5, except the capital stock tax of 1873. This amount also includes the interest due for the years 1874-5-6.

REPUBLICAN JUDICIAL CONVENTION.

W. C. Bennett, chairman of the Republican county committee, acting under the pressure of party influence or perhaps "at the request of two or three friends," has called a county convention to be held at the court house in this city, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of July 16th, to choose delegates to the Republican district convention, to elect a third candidate for circuit judge.

The basis of representation will be one delegate for every 50 Republican votes cast at the last Presidential election, and one delegate for every fraction of 25 votes or over which gives the following number of delegates:

Turner Festival. The 22d annual festival of the Turner Societies of the United States will be held in Milwaukee from July 18th to the 23d, inclusive.

On the 18th there will be a grand reception of the guests by the president of the executive committee; a speech by the mayor; a meeting of teachers of gymnastics and a social entertainment in the evening.

On the 19th there will be a grand procession of the societies from all parts of the United States through the principal streets of the city, to Quentin's Park, where will be mass exercises in calisthenics, participated in by all active members; general class turning; prize competition by classes in calisthenics and marching exercises; juvenile class exercises by 1,200 boys and girls of the Milwaukee schools, and closing in the evening by a grand midnight festival, at which there will be hours of 200 voices.

On the 20th will follow competitive class turning; prize rifle practice; declamations, procession; to close in the evening with a grand gymnastic exhibition by the Milwaukee Societies.

On the 21st—continuation of prize turning; turning by boys 14 and 16 years of age; leaping; climbing; foot racing; throwing lances; putting stones; procession to close with two grand balls and a supper.

On the 22d—meeting of teachers; prize swimming; procession; picnic; foil practice; club swinging; gymnastic exhibition by the juveniles—34 classes of boys and 18 classes of girls, and to close by two societies in the evening.

On the 23d—excursions about the city under the auspices of the Milwaukee Turners and farewell escorts.

All the railroad and steamboat lines have reduced the rate of fare for the occasion, and there will probably be a large party of Turners attend the festival on this city, Moline and Davenport.

Niles & Co.'s flour mill and distillery, at Kewanee, in 1873, recovered \$5,000 from the company. J. A. McKenzie made a two and a half hour speech for the plaintiff, C. K. Ladd managed the case for the defendants.

In Mendota there is a question of jurisdiction between Alderman Coleman and Policeman O'Keefe. The former found the latter in a fight, separated the belligerents, and disarmed the policeman, claiming that the officer was drunk. Then the policeman arrested the Alderman and put him in the lock up, thereby clearly indicating that the "star" was the "best man," if not the ranking official.

There was a key in the kiss of a young girl Spring the other day, and she inserted the key between the lips of her lover as he was bidding him farewell as he was going to the penitentiary. With the key he unlocked the handcuffs that bound him and made a leap for liberty from the car. He was overtaken and made a dash for it, but he had been kissed at the last.

There is trouble at the glass factory at Buffalo, just opposite Adalusia. A correspondent writes: Our glass factory has come to a standstill. The operatives were compelled to strike. They worked a week or two, but the glass was banded by incompetent hands and produced no money for the laborer. That there is a necessity for Messrs. Kid & Co., who furnished the coal to pocket \$600 or \$800 loss and the laborers in proportion, no one can accept as correct. The glass was banded, however, and languishes in an investigation going on, and a grinning fellow sitting at the factory door, placed there by the sheriff.

NOTES HERE AND THERE.

The firecracker season is near at hand. Prairie schooners are still sailing westward. Teachers' Institute opens at Geneseo, July 9th. Geneseo will celebrate the fourth by a picnic in the park. John Graham, the Coaltown rough, will be released from jail to-morrow. Geneseo has 11 churches, and only 8 saloons. Rock Island has 18 churches and 76 saloons. The Central Illinois Fair will be held at Peoria, from the 11th to the 14th of September. Mrs. Alice Carr was released from jail to-day, her term of imprisonment, as charged by the court, having expired. John A. King, of the Western Brewery has sold half his interest in that institution—to a 10 pound boy, who arrived this morning. An interesting incident at the reception given to Patrick at Des Moines was the call for Eliza Finkston, the mother of the Republican party. Notices are being served upon all water takers to drop into the city clerk's office by July 1st, and pay up their water rent six months in advance. The lawyers of this new judicial district should hold a convention and nominate a judge. The people would endorse the lawyers nomination, at the election. The Island City boys "scooped" the High school boys, of Davenport, in a matched game of ball in Davenport's pasture, this city, Thursday afternoon—the score standing 17 to 22. Of all the bores who have thrust their oratorical requirements upon the republicans of this State, B. Packard, of Louisiana, is entitled to the first premium. Des Moines State Leader. The Aleo Banner publishes, this week, a list of the premiums for the 24th annual fair of the Mercer County Agricultural Society, which will be held in Aleo on Sept. 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th. Packard has been in Des Moines, and the Leader says: "Any man who could shoot at Packard and hit him in the knee would, if he was aiming at a barn hit a cow in a hundred acre pasture on his neighbor's farm." "Sunday is the golden clasp that binds together the volume of the week," says a writer. It is also a good time to pull your boots and try what bunion remedies you have accumulated during the preceding six days. At one of the recent races at Grand Rapids, Mich., 19 horses started, and among them was Little Wonder, driven by Parker Wineman, of this city. During the race Mr. Wineman was "out down"—his sky being smashed to kindling wood and his mare coming to an injury, though he escaped without injury. The Republican papers in this vicinity are busy "puffing" Packard's speech in Des Moines—but the Leader says of it: "The anti-policy men, who, it is reported, paid Packard \$500 to come out here last night. All agree that it was flat." O. E. Young's store on Front street, Galva, was entered by burglars last Sunday night. They gained admittance by breaking out a pane of glass in one of the back windows. It is supposed that some ready-made clothing was taken; nothing else was missed. If the new civil service rules concerning Federal officers taking part in campaigns and manipulating conventions are enforced it is feared that Iowa will be entirely bereft of officials since the close of the state convention. Nine-tenths of the delegates and the spectators were officeholders. In speaking of the Iowa state Republican convention the Des Moines Leader says: "A large proportion of the members of the convention to-day have attended every convention in the State since the organization of the party over a score of years ago. Being office holders, 'few die and none resign.'"
