### WAR TO THE KNIFE.

#### CHAMBERLAIN WILL OPPOSE PARNELL TO THE BITTER END.

##### The Radical Platform—The Difficulty Between Spain and Germany—Colonization at Sea—Items of Interest from the Old World.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Mr. Chamberlain, in a speech at Warrington Tuesday, gave the full Radical platform. He said the Radicals now formed a great majority of the Liberal party, and they would oppose Mr. Parnell tooth and nail. This declaration was greeted with prolonged cheering. Continuing, he said the granting of home rule to Ireland would mean the destruction of the British empire. He had prepared a moderate scheme of domestic government for Ireland which had met with the approval of the National leaders. If the Liberals did not like the Radical platform they must sever their connection with the Radicals. The Radical platform, besides the local government and land planks, advocates free schools, a revision of the taxation and game laws and mineral royalties, and declares that if the appropriation of certain land is necessary for the public good the rights of property must go to the wall. Mr. Chamberlain scouted the idea that Lord Harrington would accept Lord Randolph Churchill's invitation to join the Conservative party. Liberalism was broad enough to settle its own differences. The Radical demands were moderate enough to satisfy all sensible men. Churchill's resistance about Ireland was ominous. Parnell's policy was in many respects, a worthy one, but separation meant another foreign country thirty miles from England's shores, animated at the outset with enmity to England. It was the duty of any government to avert such a calamity. If those were Parnell's only terms the Radicals would never enter into a compact with him.

The Standard says it is willing to forget much of Mr. Chamberlain's socialism in consideration of the manner in which he outgitted Parnell in his speech at Warrington.

The Daily News says: At the present moment there is less reason than ever for the Whigs to join the Conservatives. Whether the Liberal majority be large or small it will consist of the advanced section of the party, and a Liberal falling to himself changes in the land laws and taxation has no chance of being heard.

The Standard says: The rejection of Mr. Parnell's demands by responsible Conservatives will be as much as that of Mr. Chamberlain in his speech at Warrington Tuesday. More it cannot be. The nation owes much to Mr. Chamberlain for his opportune frankness in dealing with the Irish question.

DUBLIN, Sept. 10.—The Freeman's Irish denounces Mr. Chamberlain for his speech at Warrington Tuesday, and says that henceforth he is Ireland's foe.

MADRID, Sept. 10.—Although Spain has apologized humbly to Emperor William for the recent mobbing of the German embassy, preparations for war continue to be pushed forward with great energy. All military commanders have been ordered to report at once the number of available troops at their disposal. The bitter feeling provoked against Germany has not abated a jot, and there are grave fears that instead of dying out it will be further intensified by the secret agents of the revolutionary party. King Alfonso will insist, in the face of popular clamor, in keeping his old ministry in power, but if the discontent continues it is quite likely he will be compelled to call upon Sagasta to the direction of affairs. And in that event a rupture with Germany can hardly be averted.

It is rumored that the government has received information from the man-of-war Velasco showing that the report that the Poles had been occupied by Germany is not true. Military men here insist that their comrades at Vap acted under orders from Madrid in the order to report to avoid a conflict with the Germans.

The campaign against the press is active. Thirty-four papers of Madrid have been seized by the wholesale. The censorship also prevents true accounts being received of the expressions of popular wrath against Germany at Saragossa, Valencia, Barcelona, Granada and twenty other places.

King Alfonso drove through the streets of Madrid Tuesday without an escort. He was greeted respectfully by the people.

### ADA SWEET RESIGNS.

#### Mrs. Col. Mulligan Appointed Pension Agent at Chicago.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The appointment of Mrs. Maria Mulligan to be pension agent at Chicago fell like a bombshell in the camp of the Illinois republicans here yesterday. After Miss Sweet refused to resign in answer to Commissioner Black's request the general impression was that she would be allowed to retain her position for the present at least. This was the situation of affairs until Gen. Black sent a special examiner to look into the manner in which business was conducted in the Chicago office. His report disclosed an interesting condition of affairs, but the commissioner even then was gallant enough not to pursue a woman. It appears, however, that the president had watched the course of events with unusual interest. Somehow Miss Sweet found it best to resign.

At the white house but little information can be gleaned. Col. Lambert said that Miss Sweet had tendered her resignation, and that the president had merely filled the vacancy by the appointment of Mrs. Mulligan, whose appointment had been urged all along by Gen. Black.

Mrs. Mulligan is the wife of Col. James A. Mulligan, who died of wounds received near Winchester, Va., July 26, 1864. Col. Mulligan was brevetted brigadier general for gallantry and bravery only three days before his death. He commanded the 23d Illinois regiment.
