COMMITTEE OF FIFTEEN GIVES OUT LIST OF "RICH AND PROMINENT" RESORT OWNERS

*Sixty-two in List, Including Chicago Title & Trust Co.
and Men Like W. M. Howland, T. K. Lyons, John
O'Malley, W. H. Cowles and J. L. Kesner.*

The Committee of Fifteen, the work of which has been conducted by Samuel P. Thrasher of New England for the last few weeks, yesterday sent Mayor Harrison, Chief McWeeny and Health Commissioner Young lists of sixty-two disorderly resorts which now are running wide open.

The lists not only give the names of the keepers of each and every resort where such names are known, but also the names of the owners of each piece of property being used for purposes of prostitution.

It is the inclusion of these names of property owners, many of whom are men of wealth and "rich and respectable citizens," and not a few of whom appear to be respectable women, that makes the publication of the lists the first real work done by the Committee of Fifteen in years.

The Committee accompanied the lists with letters saying that if the city authorities addressed should not see fit to act on the information thus given them, the Committee itself would take steps to prosecute keepers and owners, and put an end to "the nuisance," which the disorderly houses constitute under the ordinances of Chicago.

Neither Mayor Harrison, Chief McWeeny nor Health Commissioner Young has had anything to say about the communication so far. They are little likely to take action. If they

had wanted to do so, they would have done so long ago.

So it most likely will be up to the Committee to carry out its threat. And the Committee need not doubt for a moment that the pressure that will be brought to bear on it to prevent it doing so will be tremendous.
