PAY TRIBUTE TO BOOTH

London, Aug. 23.—Thousands passed today before the catafalque in Congress hall on which the body of the late General Wm. Booth lay in state.

The hall doors were opened at 10 a. m. Long before that time the adjoining streets were thronged with people come to pay a last tribute of respect to the general.

The coffin was draped in the blood and fire flag of the Salvation Army. The dead commander's cap and Bible lay upon it. The wasted face was surrounded by a massed bank of flowers. The generals who served under him surrounded the coffin as a guard of honor.
