

TO USE SPECIAL JURY

New York, Aug. 13.—The higher-up grafters in the police department will not be investigated by the Rosenthal grand jury, but by a special grand jury which will be empanelled by Justice Goff Sept. 3.

District Attorney Whitman says he has discovered a curious connection between the bank accounts of a police inspector and a civilian in the department.

Both had safety deposit boxes which they visited about the same time on several occasions, and both had savings accounts, which their salaries could not account for.

A panel of 50 men was drawn for the Goff grand jury. Twenty-three will be selected. Goff will have committing power, and the probe will extend to the whole police scandal.

The seven men indicted for the murder of Rosenthal will not be tried until this investigation is over.

BEGIN FORCING FOOD

Dublin, Aug. 23.—Prison officials today began forcibly feeding Mrs. Mary Leigh and Miss Gladys Evans, the two suffragettes sentenced to five years penal servitude for trying to burn down the Theater Royal.

The two women started a hunger strike several days ago, and are in danger of starving to death.

London, Aug. 23.—Suffragettes have started a monster petition for the release of Mrs. Mary Leigh and Miss Gladys Evans, sentenced to five years for

trying to burn the Theater Royal, Dublin, who are said to be seriously ill from forcible feeding by prison officials.

FELL DOWN ON VOW

Perth Amboy, N. J., Aug. 23.—“For better or for worse” doesn't seem to mean much to Paul King, wealthy broker of this city.

Miss Mary Pfeiffer was married to King yesterday. Just as they were leaving the altar, detectives stepped into the church and arrested Mrs. King on a charge of forgery.

The charge was preferred by Chas. K. Seaman, banker. He said Miss Pfeiffer got \$100 on a forged order. She said yesterday she used the \$100 to get a suitable trousseau for her wedding to King.

King abandoned his bride of a moment. He refused absolutely to go on her bond. She is now in jail.

King is 65 years old; his bride of a moment is 35.

MONSTROUS TENT BURNS

Sterling, Ill., Aug. 23.—The main tent of Ringling Brothers' circus was destroyed by fire late yesterday. The loss is \$25,000.

Only circus employes were under the big top at the time. But the flames spread so rapidly that one man was badly burned before he could escape.

Panic spread among the animals in the menagerie tent, but they quieted down when the canvas coverings were drawn over their cages.
