

MARKET SQUARE MARTIN STORE TO OPEN DOORS

Establishment Best of Its Kind in
Middle West, Says Head of
Operating Company.

When the new Martin cigar store,
corner Seventeenth street and Sec-
ond avenue, 18th of a chain estab-
lished by the Martin company in
the tri-cities, opens tomorrow, vis-
itors will see what is undoubtedly
the finest cigar store in the middle
west, without exception. Through
experience in the field of
managing this class of business
operators have been able to cre-
ate a store perfect in its kind, said
George Martin, president of the
company, today.

Finished throughout in solid
mahogany, glittering glass and mar-
ble, the fixtures of the store alone
are wonderfully attractive. On
the sides of the room an unbroken
stretch of plate glass allows pass-
ers-by to see into the entire store.

Under the floor is of mosaic tile
and the ceiling is of patterned steel.
On the wall above the cases and
the fixtures is finished in a taste-
ful tapestry effect.

The impression gained upon
visiting at the finished establish-
ment is one of extreme neatness,
refinement and color. There is
no apparent color scheme, but care
has been taken to avoid harshness
in contrasts. Everything has the
appearance of grace and yet util-
ity. The large amount of solid mah-
ogany used contributes to this ef-
fect.

Besides arrangements for the
sale of all forms of tobacco and
cigars quite an exceptional found-
ry and luncheonette take their
place at the north end of the room.

Seating for ladies and others
men who visit the new establish-
ment will be a feature of the
store. A general invitation to
the public has been issued by the
management to stop in and look
at the shop tomorrow and it is
expected that crowds will take ad-
vantage of the opportunity. The
policy of creating such an artistic
and business for the sale of
tobacco and light establishes appeals
to the taste of everybody.

Rock Islander this morning
commented upon the changed ap-
pearance of the corner where the
store has been installed. For
years back it was the site of
old Thomas drug store, a land-
mark of Rock Island. People see-
ing it then and returning now
never recognize the corner,
and the new store is a complete
operation a year ago. Its
interior room was completely re-
novated within and without to make
space for the Martin store.
