

EDGERTON WILL CONTINUE FARM BUREAU EXPERT

New Board Selects Advisor and Calls Meeting of Association, in Initial Session.

Palmer R. Edgerton, county farm advisor and agricultural expert for Rock Island county, was re-elected late Saturday by the recently chosen Rock Island county farm bureau board of directors, to begin a three-year term on Dec. 1. A raise in salary stipulated as a requirement to his acceptance of the office was granted, and he will receive \$8,000 per year during the coming term.

"I do not feel that I can leave now," said Mr. Edgerton today, "with justice to the members of the bureau. They have worked splendidly together and the organization is growing rapidly. Its future is assured, with a roster of

1,100 farmers." He had practically decided to return to his home in Indiana and conduct his own farm, at the expiration of this term. However, with the favorable action of the directors Saturday he has announced his intention to remain in active service here.

The decision as to the farm advisor was the chief business at the meeting of the new directors, at which E. L. Woodburn, president of the farm bureau association, presided. Officers for the next year are to be elected at a business meeting of the farm bureau association in the court house Dec. 1, when annual reports are also to be made.

The morning meeting took place in the Rock Island court house, the members adjourning to lunch at the Rock Island club at noon, where the main business was held in the afternoon.

ROCK ISLAND IS NEXT TEACHERS' MEETING PLACE

Executive Committee in Meeting in Moline Decides to Bring 1,000 to 1920 Convention.

Rock Island will be the meeting place of 1,200 or 1,500 teachers next fall when the Illinois Valley Teachers' association convenes for its 1920 annual session. This was the decision arrived at when the executive committee of the association met in Moline Saturday.

When this committee was appointed in Kewanee, Oct. 17, at the 1919 meeting, it was thought that Rock Island was practically assured the next meeting, because of the predominance of local influence on the committee. This body, whose chief business it was to select a place for the convention, consists of L. A. Mahoney of Moline, W. A. Robb of Spring Valley and N. R. Mason of Bureau county.

FORD OWNERS

If your Ford starts hard these cold days, the chances are that it needs a "Special Tune-up."

If there is anything that makes a motor snappy and give that quick response so desirable, it is a "Special Tune-up."

For the benefit of those Ford Owners who may not know what constitutes a "Special Tune-up," we give below the operations we consider necessary in order to turn out a first class job.

First—All spark plugs are removed from the motor, taken apart, thoroughly inspected and cleaned. Proven defective parts and porcelain are replaced. Plugs are then assembled, spark gaps properly spaced and plugs put back in the motor. Wires leading from dash to plug are then tested and, if broken or defective, are replaced.

Second—The commutator shell—commonly known as the timer case—is removed, thoroughly cleaned and then inspected. If contact points show rough spots or are worn, a new case is provided. If the commutator brush is rough or shows signs of wear it is replaced. Commutator wires are gone over and if found to be oil soaked, insulation worn off or generally in poor shape, they are replaced by new ones. The spark advance and retard rod is adjusted. The second phase of the work is completed when commutator case and brush is oiled and ready for use.

Third—Wiring on switch is examined for loose connections and possible defects. The four coils in the coil box are tested in a coil unit tester and vibrator points are examined for worn or pitted contacts, which are removed if necessary and replaced with new ones.

Fourth—The magnet contact on transmission case is removed, cleaned and inspected. Foreign matter that may have collected at point of contact with magnet is removed and contact put back in place.

Fifth—Sediment bulb under gasoline tank and float chamber of carburetor are drained to dispose of foreign matter and water that may have collected. Carburetor is then adjusted to meet the new conditions of the motor.

All this work will be done for a labor charge of \$1.75, any necessary parts extra.
