

that the greatest of all evils of poverty is the unlimited family. Last year she founded a paper called "The Woman Rebel," in which she told of the formation of a birth-control league and offered to those who wanted such information a leaflet called "Family Limitation."

I saw the four issues of this paper before it was suppressed. I have seen the pamphlet, "Family Limitation," of which 100,000 had been circulated in this country. The pamphlet contained such information regarding

birth control as nearly every family physician dispenses to his women patients. Margaret Sanger says that she undertook to place such information—already surreptitiously at the disposal of everybody with the price—before the poor, who she thinks have the greatest need of it.

And she maintains that her arrest, and her husband's arrest, whatever their legal aspect, is actually just the working out of the double standard of law in this country—one law for the rich and another law for the poor.
