## WHY RICH AND POOR CAN'T ALWAYS WORSHIP GOD IN SAME CHURCH

*Some Churches, Like Some Newspapers, Are Edited Too  
Much From the Business Office—Nothing Wrong  
With Christianity or With the Peo-  
ple—It's the Church.*

I have a letter from a reader of The Day Book which raises a question, and suggests the answer, that is of interest to everybody interested in labor or religion, or both.

It bears on the frequent complaint of a falling off in the attendance at some churches, and a frank discussion of the question and answer may help those interested in getting some light on the subject. If it only makes them think it will be worth while. Here is the letter:
