St. Louis.—Seven men injured when scaffolding used in construction of a sewer fell under weight of dozen men.

Denver.—New York Trust Co., acting as bondholders, applied for receiver for Denver Union Water Co. Company could not pay \$8,000,000 bond issue which came due today.

Fairbury, Neb.—Six inches of hail in Jefferson county. Cattle killed and crops destroyed. All fruit lost.

Dodge City, Kan.—Evertee Verbeck, South Holland, Ill., and Arthur Vogel struck and killed by lightning.

Cleveland.—Ethel Villiers, 26, Chicago, arrested for dressing in male attire. Said she had worn men's clothes for three years.

Washington.—Pres. Wilson has nominated George T. Marye of San Francisco to be ambassador to Russia.

Detroit.—Nearly \$1,000,000 in income tax assessments paid into office of internal revenue collector by 1,500 Detroiters.

New York.—Movies will be suffragets next peaceful weapon to spread doctrine of votes for women. Prize offered for best scenario to place cause before public.
