MORALS SQUAD MAN AIDED VENILLE TO GET AWAY IN TORIO'S AUTO

*Levee Policemen Tells How Investigator Thome Aided
"Roxy"—Hoyne Makes Move for Licenses—
Nootbaar After Freiberg's—Minnie Ever-
leigh Not Summoned, Says Hoyne.*

Investigator Joseph Thome, secretly reinstated to the morals squad after being discharged on a charge of being friendly to Loraine Woods, levee resort keeper, was one of the men who assisted in shoving "Roxy" Venille into Johnny Torio's auto following the killing of Stanley Birns last Thursday night.

This information was given out by a uniformed policeman, who witnessed it and who turned in a report covering it to the 22d st. station.

This officer was standing on a cor-

ner two blocks away from the scene of the shooting of Birns when he saw one man limping along assisted by two other men.

His right shoe was off and the officer noticed he was bleeding from a wound in the foot. He asked for an explanation.

"I was down near that shooting scrape at 23d and Michigan," answered the wounded man, "and I got shot by a stray bullet. I want medical attention."
