LOWER CANAL ROAD MAY BE REPAIRED

RUTLAND TOWNSHIP COMMISSIONERS DECIDE AT ANNUAL MEETING TO IMPROVE OTTAWA-MARSEILLES HIGHWAY.

(Special Correspondent.) Marseilles, Feb. 9.—At the annual meeting of the commissioners of Rutland township the matter of improving the lower or canal road, between Marseilles and Ottawa, was taken up for consideration.

The commissioners decided that as soon as the weather conditions are favorable the work of improving the road will be started. It is now the intention to straighten out the lines of the road and drain it where necessary, so that it can be properly graded and widened before being surfaced.

By private donations from farmers, automobilists and others who use this highway for commercial purposes, it is expected to secure enough money to pay the freight on crushed rock from Joliet, the rock being donated by the state.

L. W. Hess, one of the head men of the McKinley Syndicate, was in Marseilles and stated that he would not only donate toward the improvement from his private purse, but that he would see that any quantity of children, if they are desired, will be furnished from the hydro-electric plant's auxiliary steam power house.

It is the purpose to so improve this highway that the heavy traffic will be diverted over it, consequently making it possible to keep the upper or bluff road in much better condition all the time with much less expense.

By using the lower road for commercial purposes the distance between Marseilles and Ottawa will not only be shortened, but much danger to traffic by reason of the hills will be eliminated.

The proposed improvement recently received the sanction of the Marseilles Woman's Club.

OUTDOOR SHOWMEN GO ON RECORD FOR UPLIFT

Will Endeavor to Check Unjust Attacks on Their Business. Sunday Sends Message.

New York.—In these days of uplift movements the statement of the newly organized Association of the Outdoor Showmen of the World that its chief purpose in life is to uplift and purify the outdoor show business has attracted attention.

One of the outdoor showmen's announcements, made at the organization meeting and banquet at the Hotel Astor, was that of President Frank P. Spellman, who in explaining the scope of the organization said that Billy Sunday had been invited to become a member and to attend the banquet, as it was recognized that "he is the greatest showman of us all."

"We have more practical objects, of course, than the ethical uplift of the outdoor show business," said President Spellman. "We propose to exert our influence to make certain that we get a square deal in the various state legislatures. We will have legal representatives in every city, and we will correct other abuses that we believe exist. We will endeavor to check unjust attacks made on the outdoor show business and to secure fair and equitable treatment. We believe the public will be with us in this campaign."
