

LA SALLE TO HAVE DOCKS FOR WATER FREIGHT PROJECT

COMPETENT ENGINEER TO HAVE CHARGE OF CONSTRUCTION— PLAN IS TO EXTEND TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES TO NEW ORLEANS.

A competent dock and terminal engineer is to be brought to La Salle in the near future to prepare plans and estimates for the construction of permanent dockage facilities here in connection with the proposed La Salle New Orleans waterway transportation project.

Consider a New Site.

While there was no definite selection of a site yesterday, when Captain Poland and the manufacturers' committee inspected the various locations a new spot sprang into prominence, and it is being highly recommended as the location for permanent docks.

U. S. Can't Build Docks.

While the government can foster and assist in many ways the project which is now under consideration, it is legally impossible for the United States to actually construct docks and terminals for water transportation routes.

PACKING COMPANY TO SELL \$300,000 WORTH OF STOCK

CONCERN SEEKING OTTAWA SITE SELECTS ITS NAME—SHARES WILL BE DISTRIBUTED ON CO-OPERATIVE PLAN.

Illinois Co-operative Packing Company is the corporate name of the new \$300,000 company which is to locate its new packing plant in Ottawa.

The packing industry is recognized as one of the greatest industries of America and several co-operative plants that have sprung up in the United States during the last few years have been very successful.

The new corporation is organized under the laws of South Dakota and will be operated entirely by a board of directors chosen by the stockholders.

E. H. Doud, of Oak Park, and J. M. Doud, of Chicago, are the men who are responsible for bringing the plant to Ottawa.

The Chicago firm of Hagg and Blackiston, well known fiscal agents, to finance the new company and dispose of the stock.

L. W. Hagg and A. H. Blackiston and E. H. Doud are in the city today making preliminary arrangements for starting operations on the new plan.

The capital stock will consist of \$150,000 preferred and \$150,000 common. The proceeds from the sale of the capital stock will be used in the construction of the new plant.
