

# \$198,000 ESTATE IS LEFT BY WEALTHY RANSOM FARMER

### PROPERTY OF LATE CHRISTIAN WALLING LEFT IN TRUST FOR CHILDREN, WITH PROVISION THAT TITLE EVENTUALLY REST IN GRANDCHILDREN.

Disposing of an estate valued at \$198,000, the will of the late Christian Walling, wealthy Ransom agriculturist, was filed for probate late yesterday. Mr. Walling died at St. Mary's hospital in Streator on Sept. 27.

His estate consists of farm lands in Illinois, South Dakota and Indiana and a city lot in Ransom, valued at a total of \$197,000, and shares in an elevator company and personal property worth \$1,000.

By the terms of the will all the estate goes to his widow, children and grandchildren. A clause provides that if any of the heirs try to get aside the testament their share shall be divided equally between the others.

The will was drawn Oct. 1, 1918, and was witnessed by D. A. Harwood and George W. Riss of Streator. By the terms of the will his sons, Charles W. and William A. Walling, are named as executors.

The widow, Mrs. Mary A. Walling, is left all personal property.

A daughter, Mrs. Anna Funk Kepler of Howard, Ill., is left 160 acres of South Dakota land for her lifetime. At her death the land is to be divided between her children. If she dies without children it is to be equally divided between the testator's grandchildren.

Another daughter, Mrs. Louise Gray of Fowler, Ind., is left 160 acres of Indiana land, under the same terms Mrs. Kepler receives her inheritance.

A son, Charles W. Walling, of Ransom, is left one eighty-acre tract, two forty-acre tracts and an unestimated piece of land, all in La Salle county, for his lifetime. At his death it is to go to his children, and if he dies without issue the property is to be divided between all the grandchildren of the testator except William Funk in equal shares. The son is to pay his mother \$325 annually during her lifetime.

Under exactly the same terms as the equity Charles Walling receives, another son, William, receives 160 acres and an unestimated tract of land in La Salle county.

The same terms are also made for the share of another son, Andrew, who will receive 160 acres and a smaller unestimated tract of La Salle county land.

A daughter, Mrs. Christina Hanson of Fowler, Ind., is to receive 240 acres of land in Venon county, Indiana, under the same terms her brothers receive their legacies, except that she is to pay her mother \$400 annually during her lifetime.

## KENYON WOULD GIVE PRESIDENT POWER TO SEIZE COAL MINES

Washington, Oct. 6.—The president would be authorized to take over and operate coal properties in a national fuel emergency under a bill introduced today by Senator Kenyon of Iowa, chairman of the senate labor committee. Senator Kenyon's bill would be a substitute for the coal control bill in effect defeated by the senate last summer and would give the federal trade commission broad power in supervising the coal industry.

A companion bill would penalize profiteering in fuel and fix operators and distributors profits. The maximum profit would be 50 cents a ton and 40 cents for distributors. A graded system of profits was proposed, scaled according to volume handled.

The bill also would give the commission authority to inspect books of operators and dealers, with a severe penalty for refusal. Another feature would provide a new federal brokerage tax on brokers selling coal to other consumers, a feature designed to prevent pyramiding of prices.

## "CO-OP." STORES AGENT CLASSIFIED AS MYTH

Chicago, Oct. 6.—C. C. Huggins, "phantom financier" of the Western Securities Company, fiscal agents for the Co-operative Society of America, does not exist, according to postal inspectors who completed their investigation of the society's affairs yesterday.

The federal investigation has been centered about alleged operations of the securities company with a view to possible prosecution for using the mails to defraud.

Mr. Huggins, according to Harrison M. Parker, leading spirit in the society, is a "very wealthy man, living at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York, who is well known throughout the East."

United States District Attorney Charles F. Clyne will confer with Postal Inspector Charles H. Clarihan today with a view to presenting evidence now on hand to the grand jury at once.

Assistant Attorney General William C. Clausen, who investigated the society's affairs for the office of the Illinois attorney general, turned over evidence in his possession to Mr. Clarihan yesterday.
