WHEAT, CORN AND OATS

LOWER CABLES AND HEAVY ARGENTINE SHIPMENTS CAUSE LOWER OPENING--CLOSE WAS WEAKER.

Chicago, May 13.--WHEAT--Lower cables and heavy Argentine shipments caused a lower opening, July being down a shade to 84 1/2 to 85. Principal selling was by holders of September, although July was also offered quite freely and sold off to 84 1/2. Wet, cold weather in the northwest brought out buying orders early and a little firmer feeling resulted. While scolding operations in the Red river valley were being delayed by rains the winter wheat sections were being greatly benefited by additional moisture. In consequence, many early buyers disposed of their wheat and the market weakened rapidly. During the latter part of the session many bearish crop reports received, added to the weakness. Bradstreet's figures on exports of wheat flour show the smallest shipment for any week in sixteen years. There was heavy liquidation late in the session. The close showed July off 1/2 to 1/4, May down 1/2, September off 1/4. Liverpool steady to 1/4 lower. At the sea board five boats were taken.

CORN--Bearish crop reports and the slump in wheat caused general selling the latter part of the session. There was some covering by the shorts, but offerings were so liberal that a sharp break occurred. Reports from the west showing freer country acceptance increased the weakness. The market lacked rallying power and closed at a low point. Compared with yesterday's final figures July closed 1 1/2 to 1/4 lower, May a cent, Liverpool unchanged to 1/4 lower. On the seaboard five boats were accepted.

OATS--The market held quite firm early under the influence of small receipts, but offerings increased as the season advanced and prices gradually declined. Late in the session the market was affected by the weakness in wheat and corn. At the close prices were down 1/4 to 1/2.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS. By the Associated Press. Chicago, May 13.--CATTLE--Today's run was a thousand, this being small even for Friday. Most of the offerings rather ordinary in quality, sold at low range prices.

HOGS--There has been a good demand most of the week, but as cast iron shipping inquiry was not especially large, there was not much competition between buyers. Prices reached a still lower level, hogs are selling a trifle lower than at the close of last week, although sales today were largely 2 1/2 to 3 higher than yesterday.

SHEEP--With smaller supplies and active general demand prices have firmed up, clipped lambs sold as high as at any time this season, but the best wooled flocks were 20 lower than last week. Sheep also were active but failed to recover all of their recent decline. Only two thousand arrived, prices firm.
