COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS. [Official.] [Special joint session of the City Council, called by the Mayor, and held at the Council Chamber in the city of Cairo, on Wednesday evening, May 3, 1871.] Mayor Lansden presiding.

Present, Councilmen Halliday, Schuh and Taylor, and Aldermen Cunningham, Fitzgerald, Kleb, Metcalf, Rearden, Sease, Stratton, Swayne, Taylor and Winter—12. Absent, Councilmen Hurd, Wood and Woodward, and Aldermen Buder, Carroll, Walder and Winter—7.

On motion of Ald. Stratton the reading of the journal was dispensed with. Ald. Buder appeared and took his seat. In pursuance of instructions from the Council at its last meeting, the drainage committee reported that they had examined the pond near Williams' saw mill, and recommended that the work of draining off the water be done by means of a ditch connected with a sewer through the levee in the unplatted street, immediately west of the mill.

Ald. Fitzgerald presented the petition of the Hibernian Fire Co., praying the council to build a plank "run" on the north side of thirteenth Street from Commercial Avenue to their engine house. On motion of Ald. Rearden the petition was referred to the street committee.

The petition of a number of property holders in the vicinity of William Gearin's building on Ninth street, representing said building to be in a dilapidated and dangerous condition and praying the Council to declare the same a nuisance, and have it removed as such, was presented and read.

On motion of Ald. Winter, the petition was referred to a special committee of three to be appointed by the chair, said committee to be sworn before taking any action in the premises. The chair appointed as such committee, Messrs. Winter, Buder and Woodward.

The petition of Robert Brilach and others, praying the Council to drain that portion of the city in the vicinity of 21st and Walnut streets, was presented, and, on motion of Ald. Cunningham was referred to the Street Committee.

The following resolution, introduced by Ald. Cunningham, was, on motion of Ald. Winter, adopted by the following vote: Ayes—Sease, Stratton, Swayne, Winter, Buder, Cunningham, Fitzgerald, Halliday, Kleb, Metcalf, Rearden, Taylor, Schuh and Woodward—14. Nays—0.

Resolved, That the Street Committee are hereby instructed to drain the pond near Williams' saw mill as recommended in the report of the Drainage Committee. By Councilman Schuh:

Resolved, By the City Council of the city of Cairo, in joint session assembled, That the Board of Health be required to investigate the situation of the sink or water hole in the rear of Commercial Avenue, in block No. 23, and the railroad strip between Fourth and Eighth streets, as well as the sink or hole near the northeast corner of Commercial Avenue and Eighteenth street, and that they be empowered to employ the city team and chain gang, under the direction of the jailer, in making such labor and expense as may be necessary to abate the nuisances existing therein.

Ald. Cunningham moved to adopt. Carried as follows: Ayes—Buder, Cunningham, Fitzgerald, Halliday, Kleb, Metcalf, Rearden, Schuh, Sease, Stratton, Swayne, Taylor, Winter and Woodward—14. Nays—0. The following resolution was introduced and, on motion of Ald. Cunningham, adopted; the ayes and nays thereon being as follows, viz: Ayes—Buder, Cunningham, Fitzgerald, Halliday, Kleb, Metcalf, Rearden, Schuh, Sease, Stratton, Swayne, Taylor, Winter and Woodward—14. Nays—0.
