OUR TOBACCO MARKET. The market has been very inactive since our last report, owing partly to the peculiar state of the atmosphere, it not being favorable to the handling of tobacco.

We are pleased to see that the planters have taken advantage of our suggestions and are handing their tobacco with more care, and are now sending it to market in a more attractive style, as regards co-opeage and pricing.

As to the coming crop, we are desirous that each planter, for his own benefit, should take particular pains in the culture and housing of the crop of '71.

By a very careful comparison of the different home markets, we are more fully convinced than ever of the superior advantages we possess, and buyers are availing themselves of the cheap rates of freight offered at this market, to all points, caused by a legitimate and healthy competition of the various lines of transportation centering here.

With regard to the market, in their reports of April 29th they say: "Advices from Kentucky concerning the growing crop are quite unfavorable. In many localities the plants have been nearly all killed by frost or eaten up by the bugs.

Our interest is directly with the planter, and in all candor will say to you, do not trust too much to "vicissitudes," but send your tobacco to market as early as possible.

Our annual fair will take place sometime in June, due notice of which will be given you, so you can be prepared for the same. Since our last, the receipts have been 1368 hhd, making a total this season of 4255 hhd.
