The Robt. Mitchell left New Orleans on the 15th.
The Jno. Lumsden is going on the ways at Paducah for repairs.
The Richmond and Yeager were very deeply laden, but the latter added a little here.
The City of Cairo received about 200 tons yesterday, 150 of which was for Vicksburg.
The Jim. Fisk, Jr., brought 15 hhd. tobacco for Cairo, and 30 do. for re-shipment East per rail.
The river has fallen 1 foot during the past 24 hours, making the entire decline to the present time, 4 feet.
As the T. F. Eckert is now at the wharf, we suppose that long-talked-of Tennessee river picnic will come off shortly.
The Olive Branch for New Orleans, Belle Memphis for Memphis, and J. N. Kellogg and barges for New Orleans are due to-day.
The weather for several days past has been very hot, with the prospect of a shower at any moment, but which is still delayed at present writing.
The Illinois for Columbus, Jim. Fisk for Paducah, and Arkansas Belle for Evansville are the regular packets to-day to leave promptly at 5 o'clock p.m.
The Tyrone, drawing three inches more water than there was on Harpeth Shoals, grounded and remained twelve hours. The Burksville lighted her off.
Mr. Marion C. Wight, of the Cairo City Wharfboat, was the recipient of a valuable present in the shape of a very fine "plug" hat yesterday, at the hands of Mr. Jack Winter. He wears it with a clerical grace.
The Mississippi is still declining at St. Louis and above. The Ohio is falling at Pittsburg, with 2 feet 6 inches in the channel and at Louisville with 3 feet 3 inches in the chute, and 5 feet 3 inches in the canal. The Cumberland is also falling, with 4 feet scant on Harpeth shoals.
Mr. Tom. Brashear is again in the city, having visited Memphis, Vicksburg, New Orleans, Mobile, and many other cities, during the past few weeks, in search of a basier place than Cairo, and all to no purpose. He says to all appearances Cairo is doing as much business as any of them, and we are inclined to think he is right.
The Tyrone brought 234 hhd. tobacco, and 370 pkgs sundries for re-shipment South, and 170 pkgs sundries for St. Louis. Capt. Tom. Harmon is again at his post as her commander, smiling sweetly as of old, though rather feebly yet, upon all who have the good fortune to cross the stage plank of the Tyrone. We are glad to see him in his place again, for, although matters were ably and satisfactorily managed by the jovial, genial, Fate Spillers, during his absence, we could not forget the fact of her Captain's illness.
