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SELECT COUNCIL.

[Regular meeting of the Select Council.] Council Chamber, Cairo, Ill., July 13, 1871. Mayor Lansden presiding. Present—Councilmen Halliday, Hurd, Lansden, Taylor and Woodward—5. Absent—Councilman Schuh and Wood—2.

On motion of Councilman Taylor the reading of the Journal was dispensed with. ORDINANCES. Upon its second reading, "an ordinance in reference to the police force."

Upon its second reading, "an ordinance to authorize the subscription of \$100,000 to the Cairo and Vincennes railroad company."

Amendment adopted. Councilman Halliday further moved to amend by striking out the words "be finished," where they first occur in said ordinance...

Upon its second reading: "An ordinance to authorize a subscription of \$100,000 to the Cairo and St. Louis Railroad Company."

Councilman Hurd offered to amend said ordinance by adding at the end thereof the following, viz: "and provided, further, that in no case shall there be issued to said railroad company a greater amount in the bonds of the city than fifty per centum of the cost in cash of any five miles of said road-bed, as shown by the certified measurements of the engineer of said railroad, until said railroad shall have been completed, and that any surplus of said bonds not delivered under this provision shall be delivered to said railroad company, when the track thereof shall have been completed, and the cars run thereon from Cairo to St. Louis."

Councilman Taylor moved that the bill of Officer Sheehan which we laid over last meeting be allowed 1/2 for two days' services. Withdrawn.

Councilman Schuh moved to allow the amount in full. Carried as follows: Ayes—Halliday, Hurd, Schuh, Taylor and Woodward—5. Nay—0.

No further business appearing, on motion of Councilman Schuh the Council adjourned. M. J. HOWLEY, City Clerk.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Friday, July 14, 1871. The argument in the case of Fair vs. Shotwell was concluded by D. W. Munn in a speech of two hours. The jury deliberated about one hour and returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff and assessed his damage at \$1,000.

The People vs. William Carter (a negro) charged with stealing \$37 from Harmon Able. Verdict of guilty and sentenced to 5 years in the state's prison.

The People vs. Robert Stewart (a negro) charged with an assault to do a bodily injury by cutting another negro with a razor—plea of guilty, and a fine of \$30 assessed and his imprisonment in the county jail fixed at 20 days. Alright for defendant.

The People vs. Giovanni Batatine, Ferdinando Batatine and Dominico Giovanni charged with riot. Indictment quashed. Allen, Wheeler and Alright for defendants.

The People vs. same parties, charged with assault to murder by stabbing Gen. Bryce. Plea of guilty of assault to do a bodily injury by Giovanni Batatine, and a fine of \$100 assessed and imprisoned 30 days. Nolle as to Ferdinando Batatine, and the case continued as to Dominico Giovanni. The bail of the latter was placed at \$300. Allen, Alright and Wheeler for defendants.

One or two other prisoners who had been previously convicted were sentenced by the court. The criminal docket being now disposed of the common law docket will be taken up this morning at 9 o'clock—to which time court adjourned.
