DUTY OF PILOTS.

It shall be the duty of the local inspectors of all districts on the interior waters of the United States to cause boxes of a suitable size, with locks on them, to be put up at convenient places along the river for the use of all pilots; say— On the Mississippi, beginning at New Orleans, mouth of Red River, Vicksburg, mouth of White river, Memphis, Cairo, St. Louis, Keokuk, Dunleith, La Cross and St. Paul.

DUTY OF PILOTS.

It shall be the duty of every pilot to keep a correct log or memorandum of each trip from port to port, noting down all changes in the channel with marks to run such changes; he shall also give the depths of water on the bars, or where he has had the lead hoist; he shall also note down the situation of all snags and breaks that would be dangerous to a boat passing them in the night; he shall write, or cause to be written, a transcript from his log and place it in each box as he passes. (The transcript shall only be from box to box.)

PENALTY.

Any pilot refusing to keep a log, or refusing to put a correct transcript in the way boxes, or refusing to furnish his log to the inspectors, or for giving false information, shall have his license revoked for not less than six months, and a second revocation shall be perpetual. Nothing in this shall be so construed as to hold the pilot guilty of violating it if he does not land at a box; but at the first he does land at, he shall put in a memorandum embracing all the river from where he last put a communication in a box. All logs and transcripts shall be signed by the pilots who make them.

According to Handley's gauge the river is now about stationary at this point.

A slight rise is taking place at Louisville, but at Cincinnati the river is still on the decline. At St. Louis the Mississippi is trying to put on airs and make a little swell out of itself. The Arkansas is falling at Little Rock, but a rise is reported above there. The late rains have been general throughout the country, and the prospects for a rise in the rivers are better than they have been for some time. At Memphis the Mississippi is reported to be rising.

Business on the landing was very fair.

A heavy rain visited this locality last night. The fog Tuesday night was so dense that boats were compelled to lay by until it blew away. We have had several very foggy nights during the last couple of weeks, and boats have been detained considerably by them. The Belle of Pike, for Memphis, got down with a fair trip. Among her passengers was the noted Irish "puncher," Ned O'Balwin. The Fisk came down last evening with a light trip. The Argonaut put in an appearance after having several days' trouble at Powers Island. She brought down a load for the Columbia. The latter boat started to her assistance, but met her on the way down. The Capitol City, from New Orleans, had but little freight. She discharged a few packages of sundries for the north. The Illinois did not succeed in getting into port, night before last, before the fog let down on her. She laid up opposite Bird's point. The Henry Ames discharged 16 bales of hides and 70 bales of rags. Her freight for St. Louis was rather small. The Columbia cleared for White river with a good cargo. The Shannon, from New Orleans, had but little freight for any place—Cairo included. The Rob Roy came in well loaded for the south. She was detained a few hours at Dog Tooth by grounding. The Mallie Ragon skipped out for Memphis with a good trip of passengers and freight. The big Indiana, (Hoosier) will be here to-day from New Orleans and leaves for that port again Saturday. See her advertisement in another place. The Bee brought out a tow of freighted barges for the Mohawk and returned to St. Louis with a lot of empty barges. The Argonaut laid down near the Kentucky landing all day yesterday taking on a lot of stores. The big wharfboat belonging to the I. C. R. R. came off the Mound City ways yesterday in complete condition, and will be put back in her old place to-day. We suppose that the boys will shed many tears as large as marbles when they have to give up the barge that they have been doing business on since the wharfboat has been gone.
