SOUTHERN ILLINOIS. WHY IT IS CALLED EGYPT.

As there are doubtless many of our readers who are not advised as to why Southern Illinois is called Egypt, we can give them pleasure in transferring to our columns an extract from an article upon the subject from the pen of Judge A. D. Duff, which we clip from the columns of the Daily Gazette of Sunday, and we have no hesitancy in saying that we regard his version of the matter as authentic history.

Doubleless there are yet many of the early settlers of this State who remember the remarkable winter of 1820-21, familiarly known to them as the winter of the "deep snow," (this was recently alluded to in the Gazette) when the snow fell throughout the northern border counties of the state to the depth of three feet.

These good people after traveling such a distance finding corn so plentiful and to be had for their money, and being familiar, as the event shows, with the Bible story of the ten sons of Jacob going down to Egypt for corn, or, we have heard there was corn in Egypt and have come to buy for ourselves and little ones.

From and after the year 1832, that part of the state south of the large prairies, in colloquial conversation was often referred to as "Egypt," meaning the land of corn.
