RIVER NEWS.

WEATHER AND BUSINESS. The sun shone brightly yesterday, made the atmosphere quite comfortable. The nights are very cold and short makes.

RIVERS AND THEIR CONDITIONS. There is again falling and will probably be down as low as it has been any this season.

At Cincinnati the fall continues and channel is in a bad condition. The 3 feet 8 inches in the canal and falling.

The Arkansas river is reported to stand with 4 feet in the channel. Red river is falling with scant 5 feet in the lake.

The Mississippi remains about the same at St. Louis. The several ice gorges hold fast, and the probabilities for sticking like shoemaker's wax are good.

MISSISSIPPI MATTERS. The great event of the day was the rival of the Dexter in St. Louis or the Dog Tooth as there is not much difference between the two places.

The Illinois went to Mound City yesterday to go on the ways when she will be straightened up and have the forward part of her hull covered with sheet iron.

The Bodman will not go any farther up than the head of navigation, "Cairo" she sends her trip through by rail and load for New Orleans.

The Great Republic arrived from New Orleans and will load in her turn for south.
