Be it resolved by the City Council of the city of Cairo, that all persons, resident within said city, who have not been vac-cinated, and who are unable to pay the fes-for vaccination, are hereby required to call upon the City Clerk, at his office, and obtain from him a ticket which they will take, without delay, to some one of the practising physicians, resident in the city of Cairo; who will properly vaccinate them; and all such physicians are hereby requested and authorized to vaccinate all such persons who shall call upon them with such tickets, retaining the tickets and with such tickets, retaining the tickets and keeping a list of the names of the persons so vaccinated, which list, with the tick-ts as vouchers, they will present to the City Council, at its regular monthly meeting the first Monday of the month, together with their bills charging the city not more

et, to ascertain, as near as may be, whether the person or persons applying for tick-ets, are properly entitled to the same, and when satisfied that they are so entitled, he shall deliver the ticket or tickets, numbering them, consecutively, in the order of their delivery, and keeping a list of the names and place of residence in the city of the persons to whom they are deliv-

Be it further resolved, that school directors and superintendent, of schools, in the city of Cairo are hereby respectfully rewhich may hereafter reach, our city, and the schools be properly vaccinated; it being deemed best, at least at this time, that children who are not vaccinated should not attend the public schools of the city until after their vaccination.

Resolved, That the Board of Health be and they hereby are instructed ,to make whatever arrangements they may deem within the city who are afflicted with the small-pox or varioloid, and who have not the means or who are unable to obtain the means, with which to take care of themsolves.

That all persons residing in the city of Cairo and who have not al-ready been vaccinated, be and they are hereby urgently requested to attend at once to the matter of vaccination; and the attention of all persons residing in the city is hereby specially called to sections 298, 301 and 302, of the "revised ordinances," the same being sections 5 and 8 of ordinance No. 6, of those recently adopted by the city council in its late revision.
