TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

PHILADELPHIA, March 10.—President Grant spent a quiet day with Gen. Childs, incident weather preventing any other course.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—A portion of the Japanese embassy leave on Tuesday to investigate the iron works, mines and railroads of Pennsylvania.

CHARLESTON, March 26.—The Unionville 'Times' reports that arrests for alleged ku-kluxism were recommenced in Marion county last week by the deputy United States marshal, and that much excitement existed.

LONDON, March 10.—The Prince and Princess of Wales departed yesterday for the South of France. A dispatch announces their arrival in Paris, where they will remain three or four days before proceeding south.

NEW YORK, March 10.—A Wilmington special says no confirmation has been received of the reported killing of Henry Berry Lowery. Several parties are organizing for the capture of the gang.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Full accounts are published of the recent religious discussion in Rome between Protestant preachers and Catholic clergy on the subject "Was St. Peter ever in Rome?"

WASHINGTON, March 10.—Chief Justice McKean, of Utah, is still in Washington, on business connected with the judiciary of that Territory, and has had several interviews with the President and Attorney General Williams.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—The President has recognized Robert Knight as Vice-Consul of Her Britannic Majesty at Cincinnati.

The Senate Arms Committee will tomorrow examine Col. Bennett and the House Committee on Expenditures in the War Department will examine Major Crispin, Major of Ordnance stationed at New York, through whom deliveries of arms were made to purchasers.
